What Citizens Are Saying To EPA: Community Involvement Planning

In March, EPA's community involvement coordinators, Andrea Lindsay and Debra Sherbina, visited the Basin and Box. We met with over 30 people, and received 10 letters/emails. We listened to ideas about how EPA can keep people informed and give them a voice in site activities. People shared their views on the cleanup and gave us valuable background information.

The comments and ideas we heard will help us bring our community involvement program in line with the current needs at the site. We will update the site's Community Involvement Plan. Later this year, the plan will come out on EPA's website and in hard copy. Stay tuned.

Here are some of the main themes we heard. These points do not cover all the comments. The plan will share more details about the comments we heard.

Process Issues:

- Some people believe their voices have not been heard or acted upon. Citizens commonly feel "burnt out" on public involvement. Some said that they don't like the "lecture and listen" meeting format.
- There is a widespread perception of "agency vs. community;" concern about how EPA has made decisions; and a desire for EPA to just get the job done and leave.

What Citizens Are Saying To EPA *continued*

- Some people thanked EPA for its role in the cleanup.
- Some issues are still not resolved for citizens after more than 20 years of cleanup. People are still passionate about their viewpoints on the cleanup.

Blood-Lead Issues and Yard Cleanups:

- There is still disagreement and confusion about lead health risks. Some citizens pointed out a need for more education on this topic.
- Some believe that EPA is not doing enough to address blood-lead issues. Others believe the lead problem is overblown.
- People noted that blood-lead levels in the Box are down, the real estate market is up, and many yards are being cleaned.
- Some concern was expressed about the yard cleanup program, including dust, lawn quality, and recontamination issues.
- Some people are happy with their new lawns.

EPA has been working in coordination with others in the Coeur d'Alene Basin to protect public health.

Lead contamination from over a century of mining poses a risk to people in the area, especially children. The Superfund cleanup program is helping to reduce this risk.

Basin Commission:

- Many people are wondering about the future of the Basin Commission, hoping for its success. Some felt the commission is not working to represent the community or consider citizen input. However, some pointed out that the commission, with local elected officials, is the best chance for citizen representation.
- Some questioned the true influence of the Basin Commission, since it has no direct funding or ability to change the ROD.
- Some individuals felt that the Citizens' Coordinating Council does not represent the community, and is not a good forum to talk about basic citizen's issues.

Other:

- Some people believe that EPA overlooks the environmental justice concerns of tribes and others.
- Some people urged EPA to do a better job of marketing its successes and debunking misinformation.
- The National Academy of Sciences' report is widely anticipated.

Comment in June on Five-Year Review

Starting June 1, you will have a chance to comment on EPA’s draft Five-Year Review Report. Public comment periods are not required for Five-Year Review Reports; however, EPA is providing this 30-day comment period due to the high level of interest in site activities.

The report will summarize EPA’s findings from a review of the Bunker Hill Mining and Metallurgical Complex Superfund Site. The agency is evaluating cleanup effectiveness in the Bunker Hill “Box” populated areas, “Box” non-populated areas, and Coeur d’Alene Basin. The report will discuss the effectiveness of completed remedies and progress on remedies underway.

How you can get involved:

- When EPA issues the draft report, review it at an information repository or on Region 10’s website. It will be about 500 pages long.
- Send your comments during the 30-day comment period. Comments are due by **June 30, 2005**, to: **Tamara Langton**, EPA, 1200 6th Ave, Seattle, WA 98101, or langton.tamara@epa.gov.
- Come to one of EPA’s open houses in June, listed in the box on page 2. These sessions are a chance to drop in to talk with project representatives and view displays.

EPA will finalize the Five-Year Review Report in late September. Copies will be available in the information repositories in October.

2005 Yard Cleanups Getting Started

This year’s residential cleanup program is now underway. Significant work is planned for the 2005 season. The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality and their contractors are planning to clean up 300-400 properties this year through the **Basin** Property Remediation Program. In the Bunker Hill **Box**, the Upstream Mining Group plans to clean up at least 134 residential properties. This will complete the cleanup of residential properties in the Box. Blood-Lead Testing Coming Up this Summer

Each summer, the Panhandle Health District (PHD) offers blood-lead testing during a two-week period. This year, testing is expected to take place in both the Box and Basin. Watch for newspaper and radio ads and mailers with more details soon. To reach the PHD, call 208-783-0707.

The Basin blood-lead screening program covers children 6 months to 6 years old. The Box testing program covers children aged 6 months to 9 years. These younger children are more at risk to lead exposure.

Some people have asked why the Health District does not offer blood-lead testing in schools. PHD finds that school testing is not the best way to reach the highest-risk

children. Testing in schools gives PHD access only to children five years or older. It misses children not yet in school – those six months through two or three years old, who are the most sensitive population with regard to lead exposure. Testing in schools also raises confidentiality concerns: schools are not designed to separate clients, and do not have interview areas and sample collection sites. Testing may also disrupt class schedules. Finally, it is best to screen for blood lead in the summer, at a time of high exposure – when children are playing in dry, dusty conditions.

PHD Continues Lead Education in Schools

Each May, PHD sends public health nurses out to Box and Basin schools. The nurses' services are offered to public schools, Headstart, and the Christian Academy. The program teaches children from kindergarten through the third grade about lead, how it can affect them, and how to avoid it. The children learn through puppet shows, an interactive doll house, and other age-appropriate presentations. Children also take home brochures to their families.

PHD Offers Brochures and Vacuums

The PHD office at 114 W. Riverside in Kellogg offers free brochures about lead, and posts these brochures at local doctors' offices. The brochures cover information about how lead affects the body, how lead can affect pregnant women and unborn children, and other topics. PHD also provides a vacuum loan program to Box residents who do not have access to vacuum cleaners.

Big Creek Repository Taking in Waste, Search Goes on for New Site

Waste disposal for the Basin cleanup continues at the Big Creek Repository. This repository is located near where Big Creek joins the South Fork of the Coeur d'Alene River. The repository can hold 200,000-250,000 cubic yards of material. About 100,000 cubic yards have been placed during the last three construction seasons.



Big Creek Repository has limited capacity. A new site will be needed in two or three years to allow the cleanup to continue. The Repository Project Focus Team has been working to find possible new repository locations. Working through the Focus Team, several potential sites for more study have been identified. These sites will be evaluated using the process outlined in the ROD and presented to the Basin Commission.

Clean Water Funding to be Awarded Soon

The Basin Commission recently identified 12 demonstration or pilot projects for funding under the Clean Water Act. EPA is now reviewing those projects to make sure that they meet grant requirements. After EPA approves these projects for funding, the State of Idaho will submit a formal application for the funds. NAS Report Delayed

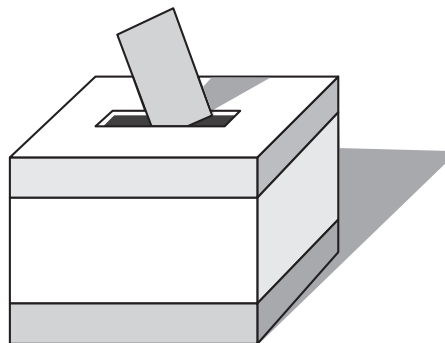
The National Academy of Sciences (NAS) is studying EPA’s assessment and cleanup decisions at the Coeur d’Alene Basin Superfund Site. EPA recently got word from NAS that the report will be delayed. A pre-publication version of the Committee’s report is now expected by mid-July, at the latest. EPA will not have a chance to review the pre-publication report prior to issuance by NAS. The delay is due to the broad scope of the investigation and the large number of

peer reviewers. The final report will now be published in mid-October. EPA anticipates conducting a careful review of the report findings and recommendations.
