**Loan Guarantee Program for Native Americans & Alaska Natives**

The Section 184 Loan Guarantee Program is a mortgage program only available to Native Americans and Alaska Natives. Highlights of the program are: Eligible borrowers include American Indians, Alaska Natives, Tribes, Indian Housing Authorities and Regional or Village Corporations formed under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act; Available every where in Alaska including tribal trust, individual allotted trust or fee simple land; 100% guarantee to the lender in the event of a foreclosure and claim; Low down payment of 2.25% based on the lower of the appraised value or cost to acquire the home. Down payment of 1.25% for loans less than \$50,000.

**Consuelo W. Gosnell Memorial MSW Scholarship**

Up to ten scholarships in amounts ranging from \$1000-\$4000 will be awarded for the 2009-2010 academic year. Gosnell Memorial MSW Scholarships are awarded for one academic year to masters degree candidates in social work who have demonstrated a commitment to working with, or who have a special affinity with American Indian/Alaska Native and Hispanic/Latino populations, or in public and voluntary nonprofit agency settings. The sponsor will support up to ten scholarships for the 2009-10 academic year.

**Community Action for Renewed Environment (CARE) Grants**

**March 16, 2009** is the deadline for community groups to submit proposals for Community Action for Renewed Environment (CARE) awards that range from \$75,000 - \$295,000. EPA is planning to award approximately \$3 million to all EPA regions. CARE grants are to help grantees form partnerships, identify and understand varied sources of risk from toxic pollutant and then prioritize and work to reduce risks through collaborative action. In Alaska, the Nunakauyarmiut Tribe, Toksook Bay, was a 2006 CARE recipient. Project goals include identifying and addressing pollution concerns related to subsistence lifestyles and reducing toxics through increased community participation in existing or planned programs.

Eligible groups include: public non-profit institutions/organizations, federally-recognized Indian tribal governments, Native American organizations, private non-profit institutions/organizations, quasi-public nonprofit institutions/organizations both interstate and intrastate, local governments (not state), colleges, and universities.

The CARE program will conduct three national information sessions for cooperative agreement applicants via national Internet seminars, or Webcasts, **February 3, 24 and 27, 2009**.

### The National Park Service Invites Proposals for NAGPRA Grants

NAGPRA (Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act) grants are awarded to museums, Indian tribes, and Native Hawaiian organizations for the purposes of assisting in the consultation, documentation, and repatriation of Native American "cultural items," including human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, and objects of cultural patrimony.

For Consultation/Documentation Grants, the final deadline is **March 2, 2009**, with award amounts ranging from \$5,000 to \$90,000.

For Repatriation Grants, the deadline is **June 30, 2009** with an award amount up to \$15,000.

### Methane Research Grants

The EPA is offering \$7 million in grants for methane research.

Through the Methane to Markets partnership, the EPA is offering up to \$7 million in grants for international projects and activities. The agency said it hopes to award 40 grants ranging from \$100,000 to \$700,000.

The EPA is requesting proposals for projects including technology transfers and demonstrations, feasibility studies, training and capacity building, information clearinghouses and improved methane emissions estimates. Proposals are due by **March 5, 2009** and the estimated project period for awards is September 2009 through September 2012.

### Know Your USDA Watersheds

For the first time, information collected over the past 40 years from instruments on large watersheds across the country is available online, thanks to an Agricultural Research Service (ARS) web site. The web site, called STEWARDS (Sustaining the Earth's Watersheds, Agricultural Research Data System), has interactive maps of watersheds. ### Polluted Water

EPA and the Centers for Disease Control issued a joint policy statement that bringing water to a rolling boil for 1 minute will kill all known waterborne pathogens, including *Giardia* and *Crypto sporidium*. Note: If you live at high altitudes (above 6,000 feet), you should boil water for 3 minutes because water boils at a lower temperature at high elevations.

**New Widget Helps “Find Your Watershed”**

A new *Find Your Watershed* widget connects to EPA’s Surf Your Watershed database. Now, anyone with a website, including their own blog, can post the widget on their own site. The widget -- found at <http://epa.gov/widgets/#watershed> -- supports watershed education and outreach.

With this widget, partners can help direct users to EPA’s Surf Your Watershed database. The database helps people find their watershed, learn about its health, and connects them with organizations at work in their watershed. EPA’s first widget, the “environmental tip of the day,” released last spring, was seen 363,000 times in June after it was posted, which is more than any single page on EPA’s website other than the home page.

**Native Groups Partner to Promote Green Careers**

Native Workplace, Navajo Green Economy Coalition and Honor the Earth are joining forces to invite tribal members around the nation to start a green information group in their own communities. The purpose of this alliance is to ensure that green career education will reach everyone in Indian country and so that all tribal members feel included and that their voice is represented.

The National Native Green Alliance will be an informal network, designed to support emerging groups and promote green business development by sharing information and connections. The talking circle will have no regular meetings, no fees and no “Roberts rules.” Events will be promoted throughout the network.

**Obama’s First Americans Public Liaison**

Wizipan Garriott, 28, has been appointed First Americans Public Liaison, a newly created position in President-elect Barack Obama’s transition team. The position is aimed at honoring a nation-to-nation relationship with tribes.

Amy Brundage, a spokeswoman for the team, confirmed Garriott’s role Dec. 10. Garriott, a member of the Rosebud Sioux Tribe, could not offer comment on the development, as members of Obama’s transition team have been instructed not to talk about their specific contributions.

Garriott’s position on the transition group brings the total number of Native Americans serving on it to seven. Indian Country Today previously reported that John Echohawk, Keith Harper, Robert Anderson, Mary Smith, Mary McNeil and Yvette Robideaux all hold positions on the team.

**Road Salt Pollution**

More than 11 million tons of salt are applied to roads in the United States annually. As ice and snow melt, or rain falls, the salt is washed into the surrounding soil. Salt also enters ground water from improperly protected storage stockpiles.

**Environmental Fugitives Most-Wanted List**

The government is starting a different kind of most-wanted list - for environmental fugitives accused of assaulting nature. These fugitives allegedly smuggled chemicals that eat away the Earth's protective ozone layer, dumped hazardous waste into oceans and rivers and trafficked in polluting cars. In its own version of the FBI most-wanted list, and the first to focus on environmental crimes, the EPA is unveiling a roster of 23 fugitives, complete with mug shots and descriptions of the charges on its Web site at <http://www.epa.gov/fugitives>

**Wetlands Information**

In the 1980s, an estimated 170-200 million acres of wetland existed in Alaska - covering slightly more than half of the state. Next to Alaska, Florida (11 million), Louisiana (8.8 million), Minnesota (8.7 million), and Texas (7.6 million) have the largest wetland acreage. In the 1600s, over 220 million acres of wetlands are thought to have existed in the lower 48 states. Since then, extensive losses have occurred and over half of our original wetlands have been drained and converted to other uses.

**Water Efficiency Resource Library**

The Alliance for Water Efficiency, a non-profit organization that promotes the efficient and sustainable use of water, has announced the launch of a web-based Water Efficiency Resource Library. The EPA is a program partner and funder. The Resource Library is intended as a one-stop shop for water efficient product and program information.

Library sections cover residential plumbing and appliances, toilet testing, landscape and irrigation, commercial and industrial water conservation, water rates and rate structures, water loss control, codes and standards, drought planning, and more. Research reports, published documents, and case studies are included. Features being added to the site include state summaries and a discussion forum. EPA is working with other federal agencies to coordinate work on climate change and water. Recently, EPA issued a joint memorandum with the U.S. Departments of Agriculture, Commerce, Defense, and Interior to describe cooperative efforts on climate change and water issues.
