



## II. PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

2.1. In accordance with 40 C.F.R. §§ 22.13(b) and 22.18(b), issuance of this Consent Agreement commences this proceeding, which will conclude when the Final Order becomes effective.

2.2. The Director of the Office of Compliance and Enforcement, EPA Region 10 ("Complainant") has been delegated the authority pursuant to Section 14(a) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136l(a), to sign consent agreements between EPA and the party against whom an administrative penalty for violations of FIFRA is proposed to be assessed.

2.3. Part II of this Consent Agreement contains a concise statement of the factual and legal basis for the alleged violations of FIFRA together with the specific provisions of FIFRA and the implementing regulations that Respondent is alleged to have violated.

## III. ALLEGATIONS

3.1. The term "person" is defined at Section 2(s) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(s), to mean "any individual, partnership, association, corporation, or any organized group of persons whether incorporated or not."

3.2. The term "device" is defined in Section 2(h) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(h), to mean, *inter alia*, "any instrument or contrivance (other than a firearm) which is intended for trapping, destroying, repelling, or mitigating any pest or any other form of plant or animal life (other than man and other than bacteria, virus, or other microorganism on or in living man or other living animals)."

- 3.3. The term "pesticide" is defined at Section 2(u) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(u), to mean, *inter alia*, "any substance or mixture of substances intended for preventing, destroying, repelling, or mitigating any pest."
- 3.4. The term "producer" is defined at Section 2(w) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(w), to mean "the person who manufactures, prepares, compounds, propagates, or processes any pesticide or device or active ingredient used in producing a pesticide."
- 3.5. The term "produce" is defined at Section 2(w) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(w), to mean "to manufacture, prepare, compound, propagate, or process any pesticide or device or active ingredient used in producing a pesticide."
- 3.6. The term "establishment" is defined at Section 2(dd) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(dd), to mean "any place where a pesticide or device or active ingredient used in producing a pesticide is produced, or held, for distribution or sale."
- 3.7. Under Section 12(a)(2)(L) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136j(a)(2)(L), it is unlawful for any person "who is a producer to violate any of the provisions of [Section 7 of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136e]."
- 3.8. Respondent is a corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of Oregon and is, therefore, a person under Section 2(s) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(s).
- 3.9. Respondent is a producer as that term is defined at Section 2(w) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(w).
- 3.10. Section 7(c) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136e(c), and 40 C.F.R. § 167.85, require any producer operating an establishment to annually submit to EPA by March 1 a pesticide report which shall include the following: (1) Name and address of the establishment and (2) amount of



each pesticidal product produced during the past year, sold or distributed during the past year, and estimated to be produced during the current year.

3.11. According to Section 7(c) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136e(c), and 40 C.F.R. § 167.85, the producer must submit a report for each pesticide establishment the producer operates.

3.12. At all times relevant to this CAFO, Respondent owned and operated a facility located at 10778 SW Manhasset Drive, Tualatin, Oregon 97062 ("the Facility").

3.13. The Facility is an establishment as that term is defined at Section 2(dd) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(dd).

3.14. Respondent produces pesticides at the Facility. The Facility has been registered as a pesticide-producing establishment since 2011 and is assigned EPA establishment number 88493-OR-001.

3.15. Respondent failed to submit a pesticide report for calendar year 2015 by March 1, 2016 for the Facility.

3.16. Therefore, Respondent violated FIFRA in accordance with Section 12(a)(2)(L) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136j(a)(2)(L).

3.17. Pursuant to Section 14(a)(1) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136l(a)(1), and 40 C.F.R. Part 19, EPA may assess a civil penalty of not more than \$18,750 for each violation.

#### **IV. TERMS OF SETTLEMENT**

4.1. Respondent admits the jurisdictional allegations of this Consent Agreement.

4.2. Respondent neither admits nor denies the specific factual allegations contained in this Consent Agreement.



4.3. As required by Section 14(a)(4) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136l(a)(4), EPA has taken into account the appropriateness of such penalty to the size of Respondent's business, the effect on Respondent's ability to continue in business, and the gravity of the violation. After considering all of these factors, EPA has determined and Respondent agrees that an appropriate penalty to settle this action is \$4,320 ("the Assessed Penalty").

4.4. Respondent agrees to pay the Assessed Penalty within 30 days of the effective date of the Final Order.

4.5. Payments under this Consent Agreement and the Final Order may be paid by check (mail or overnight delivery), wire transfer, ACH, or online payment. 4.6. Concurrently with payment, Respondent must serve photocopies of the check, or proof of other payment method, described in Paragraph 4.5 on the Regional Hearing Clerk and EPA Region 10 at the following addresses:

4.7. If Respondent fails to pay any portion of the Assessed Penalty in full by its due date, the entire unpaid balance of the Assessed Penalty and accrued interest shall become immediately due and owing. If such a failure to pay occurs, Respondent may be subject to a civil action under Section 14(a)(5) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(a)(5), to collect any unpaid penalties, together with interest, handling charges, and nonpayment penalties, as set forth below.

4.8. If Respondent fails to pay any portion of the Assessed Penalty in full by its due date, Respondent shall also be responsible for payment of the following amounts:

4.8.1. Interest. Pursuant to 31 U.S.C. § 3717(a)(1), any unpaid portion of the Assessed Penalty shall bear interest at the rate established by the Secretary of the Treasury from the effective date of the Final Order contained herein, provided, however, that no interest shall be payable on any portion of the Assessed Penalty that is paid within 30 days of the effective date of the Final Order contained herein.

4.8.2. Handling Charge. Pursuant to 31 U.S.C. § 3717(e)(1), a monthly handling charge of \$15 shall be paid if any portion of the Assessed Penalty is more than 30 days past due.

4.8.3. Nonpayment Penalty. Pursuant to 31 U.S.C. § 3717(e)(2), a nonpayment penalty of 6% per annum shall be paid on any portion of the Assessed Penalty that is more than 90 days past due, which nonpayment shall be calculated as of the date the underlying penalty first becomes past due.

4.9. The Assessed Penalty, including any additional costs incurred under Paragraph 4.8, represents an administrative civil penalty assessed by EPA and shall not be deductible for purposes of federal taxes.

4.10. The undersigned representative of Respondent certifies that he or she is authorized to enter into the terms and conditions of this Consent Agreement and to bind Respondent to this document.

4.11. The undersigned representative of Respondent also certifies that, as of the date of Respondent's signature of this Consent Agreement, Respondent has corrected the violation(s) alleged in Part II.

4.12. Except as described in Paragraph 4.8, each party shall bear its own costs and attorneys' fees in bringing or defending this action.

4.13. For the purposes of this proceeding, Respondent expressly waives any right to contest the allegations contained in the Consent Agreement and to appeal the Final Order.

4.14. The provisions of this Consent Agreement and the Final Order shall bind Respondent and its agents, servants, employees, successors, and assigns.

4.15. Respondent consents to the issuance of any specified compliance or corrective action order, to any conditions specified in this consent agreement, and to any stated permit action.



4.16. The above provisions in Part IV are STIPULATED AND AGREED upon by Respondent and EPA Region 10.






