Dear Mr. Strickland:

Enclosed is an Administrative Order (Order) issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) under the authority of section 1414(g) of the Safe Drinking Water Act, 42 U.S.C. § 300g-3(g). Among other things, the Order alleges that the Sweetwater Improvement and Service District (District), as owner and/or operator of the Sweetwater Improvement and Service District public water system (System), has violated the National Primary Drinking Water Regulations at 40 C.F.R. part 141 (Drinking Water Regulations).

The Order is effective upon the date received. Please review the Order and within 10 days provide the EPA with any information you believe the EPA may not have (e.g., any monitoring that may have been done but not submitted, any updates to the numbers of connections and/or individuals served, etc.). If the EPA does not hear from you, the EPA will assume this information is correct.

If the District complies with the Order, the EPA may close the Order without further action. Failure to comply with the Order may lead to substantial civil penalties and/or a federal court injunction ordering compliance.

Please be aware that the District is required to submit to the EPA a plan and schedule for bringing the System into compliance with the Drinking Water Regulations. The EPA encourages the District to contact any other governmental agency or agencies that may require approval of the plan and/or schedule prior to modifying the System.

The Small Business Regulatory Enforcement and Fairness Act (SBREFA) may apply to this situation. Enclosed is a small business information sheet, outlining compliance assistance resources available to small businesses and small governments, in case these are relevant. SBREFA does not eliminate the responsibility to comply with the Order or the Drinking Water Regulations.

The Safe Drinking Water Act requires that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) notify locally elected officials of certain enforcement actions taken in their area.

An Administrative Order (Order) is being issued to the Sweetwater Improvement and Service District, as owner and/or operator of the Sweetwater Improvement and Service District Water System, located in Weston County, directing it to comply with the National Primary Drinking Water Regulations. The violation alleged in the Order is failure to comply with the Surface Water Treatment Rule filtration and disinfection requirements.

-		ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER		
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- 1. This Order is issued under the authority vested in the Administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) by section 1414(g) of the Safe Drinking Water Act (the Act), 42 U.S.C. § 300g-3(g), as properly delegated to the undersigned officials.
- 2. Sweetwater Improvement and Service District (Respondent) is a public body created by or pursuant to Wyoming law that owns and/or operates the Sweetwater Improvement District System (the System), which provides piped water to the public in Weston County, Wyoming, for human consumption.
- 3. The System is supplied by an impoundment on Sweetwater Creek, a surface water source, via the Horton Pipeline. The System's water is not centrally treated; individual homeowners use various point-of-entry treatment systems.
- 4. The System has approximately 17 service connections used by year-round residents and/or regularly serves an average of approximately 46 year-round residents. Therefore, the System is a "public water system" and a "community water system" as defined in 40 C.F.R. § 141.2 and section 1401 of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 300f. The EPA identified the System as a public water system in May 2014.
- 5. Respondent is subject to the Act and the National Primary Drinking Water Regulations (Drinking Water Regulations) at 40 C.F.R. part 141. The Drinking Water Regulations are "applicable requirements" as defined in section 1414(i) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 300g-3(i).

VIOLATIONS

6. Because the System obtains its water from a surface water source, Respondent is required to comply with the filtration and disinfection requirements in 40 C.F.R. §§ 141.70-141.76, 141.500-141.571 and 141.700-141.723 (40 C.F.R. part 141, subparts H, T and W). Respondent has not done so and, therefore, has violated these requirements.

ORDER

Based on the above violations, Respondent is ordered to perform the following actions upon Respondent's receipt of this Order (unless a different deadline is specified below):

7. Within 90 days after receipt of this Order, Respondent shall provide the EPA with a plan and schedule for Respondent to come into compliance with 40 C.F.R. part 141, subparts H, T and

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W, either by meeting the filtration and disinfection requirements that apply to surface water sources or by switching permanently to an alternate source of water that is not subject to these requirements. The plan shall include proposed modifications to the System, estimated costs of modifications, and a schedule for completion of the project and compliance with 40 C.F.R. part 141, subparts H, T and W or connection to an alternate source of water that is not subject to these requirements. The proposed schedule shall include specific milestone dates and a final compliance date. The schedule must be approved by the EPA before construction or modifications can begin.

- 8. Each deadline in the schedule required by paragraph 7, above, shall be incorporated into this Order as an enforceable requirement upon written approval by the EPA.
- 9. Within 90 days after receipt of the EPA's approval of the schedule required by paragraph 7, above, Respondent shall provide the EPA with quarterly reports on the progress made toward bringing the System into compliance with the plan. Each quarterly report is due by the 10th day of the month following the end of the relevant quarter.
- 10. Within 10 days after completing all tasks included in the schedule required by paragraph 7, above, Respondent shall notify the EPA of the project's completion.
- 11. No later than the final date specified in the approved schedule, or no later than 2 years after receipt of the EPA's approval of the schedule required by paragraph 7, above, whichever is earlier, Respondent shall either (a) achieve and maintain compliance with 40 C.F.R. part 141, subparts H, T and W, or (b) permanently switch to an alternate source of water that is not subject to these requirements. If Respondent's plan fails to achieve permanent compliance, the EPA may order further steps and/or seek penalties for noncompliance.
- 12. If the population or number of connections served by the System falls below 25 individuals or 15 connections, Respondent will notify the EPA in writing within 10 days.
- 13. This Order shall be binding on Respondent, any of its successors and assigns, and any person (e.g., employee, contractor or other agent) acting in concert with Respondent.
- 14. If Respondent (a) leases or sells the System to another person or entity, or (b) contracts with or hires any other person or entity to operate the System, Respondent shall, no later than the date of such lease, sale, or other contract, provide a copy of this Order to the lessee, purchaser or contractor and, no later than 10 days thereafter, notify the EPA in writing of the lease, sale or other contract with such notification to include the name and contact information of the person who has leased, bought or contracted to operate the System. Respondent shall remain obligated to comply with this Order even if Respondent leases the System to another person or entity or hires another person or entity to operate the System.

15. Respondent shall send all reporting and notifications required by this Order in writing to:

GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 16. This Order shall not constitute a waiver, suspension or modification of any requirement of the Act or the Drinking Water Regulations. Issuance of this Order is not an election by the EPA to forgo any civil or criminal action.
- 17. Violation of any part of this Order or the Drinking Water Regulations may subject Respondent to a civil penalty of up to \$37,500 (as adjusted for inflation) per day of violation. 42 U.S.C. § 300g-3; 40 C.F.R. part 19.
- 18. Respondent may seek federal judicial review of this Order pursuant to section 1448(a) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 300j-7(a).
- 19. This Order is effective upon receipt by Respondent and will continue to be in effect until closed by the EPA.
