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1. Introduction and Scope of Permit

Title V is a national operating permit program for air pollution sources. Facilities subject to Title V must obtain a Title V permit and comply with specific Title V procedures to modify the permit. This permit replaces the facility's other existing permits. Title V does not necessarily include any new requirements for reducing emissions. It does, however, include new permitting, noticing, recordkeeping, and reporting requirements.

Pursuant to Title V of the federal Clean Air Act and AQMD Rule 3004(f), a Title V permit shall expire five years from the date of issuance unless such permit has been renewed. Accordingly, each facility is required to submit a Title V renewal application and requested the AQMD to renew their Title V permit. The proposed permit incorporates updates to the facility information provided in the facility's Title V renewal application and all rules and regulations that are currently applicable to the facility.

The AQMD implements Title V through Regulation XXX – Title V Permits, adopted by the AQMD Governing Board in order to comply with EPA's requirement that local air permitting authorities develop a Title V program. Regulation XXX was developed with the participation of the public and affected facilities through a series of public workshops, working group meetings, public hearings and other meetings.

The Title V major source threshold for a particular pollutant depends on the attainment status of the pollutant. NO₂, SO₂, and lead are in attainment with federal standards. The status of CO is currently serious nonattainment, but AQMD has petitioned to EPA for redesignation to

attainment status. The status for PM-10 is serious nonattainment. The status for ozone is currently extreme nonattainment.

A Title V renewal permit is proposed to be issued to cover the operations of Jacuzzi Whirlpool Bath located at 14880 Monte Vista Avenue, Chino, CA 91710. This facility is subject to Title V requirements because it is a major source.

2. Facility Description

This is an existing facility that is in the business of bath tub manufacturing. The facility operates eleven spray booths, two storage tanks, three blending tanks, and other supporting equipment. Emissions from the eleven spray booths, two storage tanks, and three blending tanks are controlled by an air pollution control system consisting of post spray booths exhaust filters and bag filters to control the PM emissions, and a zeolite rotor concentrator and a regenerative thermal oxidizer to control the VOC emissions.

3. Construction and Permitting History

The facility has been in constant operation with a Title V permit at this location since 2002. Numerous permits to construct and or permits to operate have been issued to the facility since October 2002. An initial Title V permit was issued to the facility on October 15, 2002 and several permit revisions were subsequently issued to this facility.

4. Regulatory Applicability Determinations

Applicable legal requirements for which this facility is required to comply are required to be identified in the Title V permit (for example, Section D, E, and H of the proposed Title V permit). Applicability determinations (i.e., determinations made by the District with respect to what legal requirements apply to a specific piece of equipment, process, or operation) can be found in the Engineering Evaluations. This facility is not subject to any NSPS Requirements. However, the facility is subject to the requirements of 40CFR63 Subpart WWWW-National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants: Reinforced Plastic Composites Production. The requirements of this NESHAP are reflected in the Title V permit.

5. Monitoring and Operational Requirements

Applicable monitoring and operational requirements for which the facility is required to comply are identified in the Title V permit (for example, Section D, F, and J and Appendix B of the proposed Title V permit). Discussion of any applicable operational requirements can be found in the Engineering Evaluations. All periodic monitoring requirements were developed using strict adherence to the following applicable guidance documents: SCAQMD Periodic Monitoring Guidelines for Title V Facilities (November 1997); CAPCOA/CARB/EPA Region IX Periodic Monitoring Recommendations for Generally Applicable Requirements in SIP (June 1999); and CAPCOA/CARB/EPA Region IX Recommended Periodic Monitoring for Generally Applicable Grain Loading Standards in the SIP: Combustion Sources (July 2001).

Emissions from the eleven spray booths, two storage tanks, and three blending tanks are vented to an air pollution control system consisting of post spray booths exhaust filters and filter bags to control particulate emissions, and a zeolite rotor concentrator and a regenerative thermal oxidizer (RTO) to control the VOC emissions. The uncontrolled VOC emissions to the zeolite concentrator and RTO is greater than the major source threshold for VOC of 10 tons per year. As a result, the zeolite concentrator and RTO are subject to the Compliance Assurance Monitoring (CAM) requirements of 40 CFR Part 64. Permit conditions have been added to satisfy the CAM requirements. Such permit conditions were developed using the design criteria and other pertinent requirements identified in 40 CFR 64- Compliance Assurance Monitoring and Technical Guidance Document and in the August 1998 Revised Draft CAM.

However, since the pre-control potential to emit of PM10 from the equipment is less than 70 tons per year, the Compliance Assurance Monitoring (CAM) requirements of 40 CFR Part 64 is not applicable to the filters.

6. Permit Features

Permit Shield

A permit shield is an optional part of a Title V permit that gives the facility an explicit protection from requirements that do not apply to the facility. A permit shield is a provision in a permit that states that compliance with the conditions of the permit shall be deemed compliance with all identified regulatory requirements. To incorporate a permit shield into the Title V permit involves submission of applications for change of conditions for each equipment affected by the permit shield. Permit shields are addressed in Rule 3004 (c). This facility has not applied for a permit shield.

Streamlining Requirements

Some emission units may be subject to multiple requirements which are closely related or redundant. The conditions may be streamlined to simplify the permit conditions and compliance. Emission limits, work practice standards, and monitoring, recordkeeping, and reporting requirements may be streamlined. Compliance with a streamlined condition will be deemed compliance with the underlying requirements whether or not the emission unit is actually in compliance with the specific underlying requirement. This facility has not applied for any streamlined conditions.

Health Risk from Toxic Air Contaminants

The facility is subject to review by the Air Toxics Information and Assessment Act (AB2588). The AQMD is tracking the status of the facility under AB2588.

8. Compliance History

As noted, the facility has been in constant operation with a Title V permit since 2002. The facility has been subject to both self-reporting requirements and AQMD inspections. The facility has had no Notices of Violation issued in the last two years. However, sixteen odor complaints were filed between September and November 2005. The odor problems were resolved by the replacement of the oxidizer. No odor complaints have been filed since the installation of the new oxidizer. Also, the facility was issued a Notice to Comply on 9/21/2006 requiring the applicant to provide a list of VOC containing materials vendors, MSDS for all resin used at the facility, and records of daily VOC usage and monthly VOC emissions. The facility provided the requested information and is currently operating in compliance with all applicable rules and permit conditions.

9. Compliance Certification

By virtue of the Title V permit application and issuance of this Title V renewal permit, the reporting frequency for compliance certification for the facility shall be annual.
