Dear Mr. Olson:

On behalf of the Commonwealth, the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection and the Massachusetts Department of Fish and Game and its Division of Fisheries and Wildlife have reviewed the Final Permit Modification to the Reissued RCRA Permit and Selection of CERCLA Remedial Action and Operation and Maintenance for Rest of River dated October 2016 (Final Permit Modification), along with the related Statement of Basis. Without limitation, the Commonwealth notes that key provisions of the selected remedy include the disposal of all excavated contaminated soil and sediment off-site at existing licensed facilities approved to receive such soil and sediment, restoration of areas disturbed by the remediation in accordance with MESA and other ARARs, and sediment removal throughout Woods Pond and the placement of an Engineered Cap to result in a post-capping minimum water depth of 6 feet measured from the crest of the dam except in the near-shore areas.

The Commonwealth concurs with the remedy set forth in the Final Permit Modification.
