

4. Pursuant to Section 402 of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1342, EPA authorizes states to issue National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (“NPDES”) permits that, among other things, prescribe conditions whereby a discharge of pollutants may be authorized and establish design, construction, operation, and maintenance requirements for the permit holder.
5. Section 504(12) of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1362(12), defines the term “discharge of pollutant” to include “any addition of any pollutant to navigable waters from any point source.”
6. To implement Section 402 of the CWA, the EPA promulgated regulations codified at 40 C.F.R. § 122. Under C.F.R. § 122.1, a NPDES permit is required for the discharge of pollutants from any point source into waters of the United States.
7. “Pollutant” is defined by Section 502(6) of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1362 to include, *inter alia*, biological materials and agricultural waste discharged to water.
8. “Point source” is defined by Section 502(14) of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1362 to include “any discernible, confined and discrete conveyance, including but not limited to any pipe, ditch, channel, tunnel, conduit, well, discrete fissure, container, rolling stock, concentrated animal feeding operation . . . from which pollutants are or may be discharged.”
9. “Animal feeding operation” or “AFO” is defined by 40 C.F.R. § 122.23(b)(1) as a lot or facility where animals have been, are, or will be stabled or confined and fed or maintained for a total of 45 days or more in any twelve month period, and where crops, vegetation, forage growth, or post-harvest residues are not sustained in the normal growing season over any portion of the lot or facility.
10. “Concentrated animal feeding operation” or “CAFO” is defined by 40 C.F.R. § 2.23(b)(2) as an animal feeding operation that is defined as a large or medium CAFO in accordance with 40 C.F.R. § 122.23(b).
11. “Large CAFO” is defined according to 40 C.F.R. § 122.23(b)(4)(iii) as an animal feeding operation that stables or confines more than “1,000 cattle other than mature dairy cows or veal calves.”
12. “Medium CAFO” is defined, according to 40 C.F.R. § 122.23(b)(6), as an animal feeding operation that stables or confines “300 to 999 cattle other than mature dairy cows or veal calves” and either of the following conditions are met:

- a) Pollutants are discharged into waters of the U.S. through a man-made ditch, flushing system, or other similar man-made device; or
 - b) Pollutants are discharged directly into waters of the U.S. which originate outside of and pass over, across, or through the facility or otherwise come into direct contact with the animals confined in the operation.
13. “Waters of the United States” are defined in 40 C.F.R. § 122.2 to include intrastate rivers and streams, and tributaries thereto.
14. “Process wastewater” is defined by 40 C.F.R. § 122.23 as water “directly or indirectly used in the operation of the AFO for any or all of the following: spillage or overflow from animal or poultry watering systems; washing, cleaning, or flushing pens, barns, manure pits, or other AFO facilities; direct contact swimming, washing, or spray cooling of animals; or dust control. Process wastewater also includes any water which comes into contact with any raw materials, products, or byproducts including manure, litter, feed, milk, eggs or bedding.”
15. “Production Area” is defined by 40 C.F.R. § 122.23 and means that part of an AFO that includes the animal confinement area, the manure storage area, the raw materials storage areas, and the waste containment areas. The animal confinement area includes but is not limited to open lots, housed lots, feedlots, confinement houses, stall barns, free stall barns, milkrooms, milking centers, cowyards, barnyards, medication pens, walkers, animal walkways, and stables. The manure storage area includes but is not limited to lagoons, runoff ponds, storage sheds, stockpiles, under house or pit storages, liquid impoundments, static piles, and composting piles. The raw materials storage area includes but is not limited to feed silos, silage bunkers, and bedding materials. The waste containment area includes but is not limited to settling basins, and areas within berms and diversions which separate uncontaminated storm water. Also included in the definition of production area is any egg washing or egg processing facility, and any area used in the storage, handling, treatment, or disposal of mortalities.
16. Iowa Department of Natural Resources (“IDNR”) is the agency within the state of Iowa authorized to administer the federal NPDES program. The EPA maintains concurrent enforcement authority with delegated state NPDES programs for violations of the CWA.

Factual Background and Findings of Violation

17. Respondents own or operate an animal feeding operation (“Riverview Cattle Facility”) that is located in the Southeast ¼ of Section 23 of Township 99 North, Range 31 West, in Emmet County, Iowa and has a street address of 1893 570th Avenue, Armstrong, Iowa 50514. The Riverview Facility consists of, among other things, six cattle confinement open lots, a feedstock storage area located west of the open lots, a concrete manure pit located at the north end of the open lots, and a manure storage area located, at the time of the inspection, between open lots four and five. The open lots have a capacity to confine approximately 900 cattle.
18. On or around June 17, 2014, EPA personnel conducted a compliance evaluation inspection of the Facility.
19. At the time of the EPA inspection, the Riverview Facility was confining approximately 886 head of beef cattle. The inspector observed and sampled pollutant discharges emanating from the confinement pens and other production areas into the tile-drainage system at the Riverview Facility. The EPA has confirmed that the tile-drainage system conveys pollutant discharges directly to the East Fork of the Des Moines River. Discussions between Respondents and the EPA inspector during the inspection also documented that manure and bedding pack generated by Bacon Maker, Inc., production areas, located south of the Riverview Facility, were stockpiled and stored at the Riverview Facility. Moreover, the Bacon Maker, Inc., was sufficiently dependent upon the Riverview Facility to feed and maintain the cattle that the Riverview and Bacon Maker production areas were likely operating as a single large concentrated animal feeding operation.
20. Since the June 17, 2014 inspection, Respondents have provided information to the EPA that they have taken steps to ensure that Bacon Maker, Inc. and Riverview production areas are operated independently to feed and maintain cattle.
21. Neither crops, vegetation, forage growth, nor are post-harvest residues sustained over any portion of the Facility’s confinement areas at times relevant to this Order.
22. The Facility confines and feeds or maintains cattle for a total of forty-five (45) days or more in any twelve month period relevant to this Order.
23. The Facility is an AFO as defined by 40 C.F.R. § 122.23(b)(1).
24. The culverts and tile-drainage system observed at the Riverview Facility facilitate

pollutant discharges from the Riverview Facility to the East Fork of the Des Moines River. The culverts and field-tile drainage system are man-made ditches, flushing systems or similar man-made devices.

25. At times relevant to this Order, the number of beef cattle confined at the Riverview Facility is between 300 and 999 head for 45 days or more during a twelve month period, and pollutant discharges flow through man-made ditches, flushing systems or similar man-made devices, therefore the Facility is a medium CAFO as that term is defined in 40 C.F.R. §122.23(b)(6) and as the term CAFO is used in Section 502(14) of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1362(14).
26. East Fork of the Des Moines River and its tributaries are waters of the United States, as defined by 40 C.F.R. Part 122.2.
27. Based on the number of cattle confined at the Riverview Facility, the presence of the drainage tiles that facilitate pollutant discharges and the proximity of the Riverview Facility to East Fork of the Des Moines River, process wastewater containing pollutants from production areas at the Riverview Facility will continue to intermittently discharge into the East Fork of the Des Moines River and/or its tributaries as a result of significant precipitation events.
28. The intermittent but continuing flow of process wastewater from Respondents' Riverview Facility to the East Fork of the Des Moines River constitutes unauthorized discharges of pollutants from a point source to waters of the United States. These are violations of Section 301 of the Clean Water Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1311, and implementing regulations.

Order for Compliance

Based on the Findings of Violation set forth above, and pursuant to Section 309(a)(3) of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1319(a)(3), Respondents are hereby ORDERED to take the following actions to eliminate its violations of the CWA:

29. Respondents shall comply with the CWA.
30. Within one hundred and eighty (180) days of the effective date of this Order, Respondents shall reduce the number of cattle confined at the Riverview Cattle Facility below the medium CAFO regulatory threshold of 300 head of beef cattle, unless the Riverview Cattle Facility can be managed in a manner that prevents all pollutant discharges into waters of the United States through a man-made ditch, flushing system,

or other similar man-made device or Respondents apply for a NPDES permit that authorizes pollutant discharges to waters of the United States.

31. If Respondents cannot cease all discharges from the Facility to waters of the United States, regardless of whether the number of livestock is reduced below regulatory thresholds, then Respondents shall immediately remove and properly dispose of manure, litter and process wastewater from areas that cannot be controlled in a manner to prevent discharges.
32. Within Sixty (60) days of the Effective Date of this Order, Respondents shall inform the EPA, in writing, of all actions that Respondents have taken or will take to comply with the Clean Water Act and the terms of this Order.
33. Upon issuance of a NPDES Permit, Respondents shall comply with all terms contained therein.
34. If Respondents intend to construct runoff control structures to allow the confinement of cattle above regulatory thresholds then beginning within sixty (60) days of the Effective Date of this Order and continuing monthly on the seventh day of each month until Respondents submit a Notice of Construction Completion to the EPA, Respondents shall submit written monthly progress reports to the EPA. The monthly reports shall describe, in detail, the construction and related activities that occurred at the Facility during the reporting period, construction and related activities anticipated during the upcoming reporting period, and a description of any problems encountered or anticipated and how these problems were/will be addressed.
35. Upon completion of runoff control structures, Respondents shall submit a Notice of Construction Completion certified by a professional engineer to the EPA within thirty (30) days of construction completion. The notification shall be in writing and shall include as-built drawings of the constructed improvements.
36. On a quarterly basis for one year beginning three months from the Effective Date of this Order, Respondents shall generate and submit to the EPA copies of inventory records that document the number of cattle confined at the Riverview Facility as well as the pen ID/numbers in which they are held, the inventory records shall include the location of any cattle owned, fed or maintained by Respondents anywhere other than at the Riverview Facility. Quarterly reporting shall also include receipts or other documentation associated with any services provided to Bacon Maker, Inc., necessary to feed or maintain cattle.

General Provisions

Opportunity to Confer

37. This Order shall become effective 30 days after its receipt by Respondents. Prior to the effective date, Respondents have the opportunity to confer with and/or submit information to the EPA concerning the validity of this Order, including the basis for the Order, the terms of the Order, and the applicability of the Order to Respondents. Within ten days of receipt of this Order, Respondents may request a conference regarding the Order or to submit information to the EPA. If Respondents request a conference or wishes to submit information, the conference or submission of information shall take place within 20 days of receipt of this Order. The EPA shall deem a failure to request a conference or to submit information as a waiver of the opportunity to confer.
38. Requests for a conference shall be made in writing to the EPA contact identified in Paragraph 44.

Effect of Order


39. This Order shall not constitute a permit under the CWA. Compliance with the terms of this Order shall not relieve Respondents of their responsibility to obtain any required local, state and/or federal permits. Respondents have the right to seek immediate federal judicial review of the Order pursuant to Chapter 7 of the Administrative Procedure Act, 5 U.S.C. §§ 701-706. Section 706, which is set forth at <http://uscode.house.gov/download/pls/05C7.txt>, provides the grounds for such review.
40. Compliance with the terms of this Order shall not relieve Respondents of liability for, or preclude the EPA from initiating an administrative or judicial enforcement action to recover penalties for any violations of the CWA, or seek additional injunctive relief pursuant to Section 309 of the CWA, 42 U.S.C. § 1319.
41. Nothing in this Order shall limit the EPA's right to obtain access to, and/or inspect Respondents' Facility, and/or to request additional information from Respondents, pursuant to the authority of Section 308 of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1318.
42. The EPA may subsequently amend this Order in accordance with the authority of the CWA. For example, the EPA may amend this Order to address any noncompliance with the CWA, including, but not limited to, any noncompliance with the requirements of Section 402 of the CWA. In the event of any such subsequent amendment to this Order,

all requirements for performance of this Order not affected by the amendment shall remain as specified by this original Order.


43. If any provision or authority of this Order or the application of this Order to Respondents is held by federal judicial authority to be invalid, the application to Respondents of the remainder of this Order shall remain in full force and effect and shall not be affected by such a holding.

45. Pursuant to 40 C.F.R. §§ 2.201-2.311, Respondents may assert a business confidentiality claim covering any portion of the submitted information which is entitled to confidential treatment and which is not effluent data. For any such claim, describe the basis for the claim under the applicable regulation. Any material for which business confidentiality is claimed should be placed in a separate envelope labeled, "Confidential Business Information." Failure to assert a claim in the manner described in 40 C.F.R. § 2.203(b) allows the EPA to release the submitted information to the public without further notice. The EPA may disclose information subject to the business confidentiality claim only to the extent set forth in the above-cited regulations. Special rules governing information obtained under the Clean Water Act appear in 40 C.F.R. § 2.302.
46. Notice is hereby given that violation of, or failure to comply with, any of the provisions of the foregoing Order may subject Respondents to (1) civil penalties of up to \$37,500 per day for each violation, pursuant to Section 309(d) of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1319(d); or (2) civil action in federal court for injunctive relief, pursuant to Section 309(b) of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1319(b).
47. The Effective Date of this Order shall be 30 days following Respondents' receipt of the Order. The terms of this Order shall become effective and enforceable against Respondents upon the Effective Date.
