CONSENT AGREEMENT

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

1. This Consent Agreement is entered into by the Director of the Enforcement Compliance and Assurance Division, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region III (“Complainant”) and Outdoor Trading, LLC (“Respondent”) (collectively the “Parties”), pursuant to Section 14(a) of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act, 7 U.S.C. § 136l(a), and the Consolidated Rules of Practice Governing the Administrative Assessment of Civil Penalties and the Revocation, Termination or Suspension of Permits (“Consolidated Rules of Practice”), 40 C.F.R. Part 22. The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act (“FIFRA” or the “Act”) authorizes the Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to assess penalties and undertake other actions required by this Consent Agreement. The Administrator has delegated this authority to the Regional Administrator who, in turn, has delegated the authority to enter into agreements concerning administrative penalties to the Complainant. This Consent Agreement and the attached Final Order (hereinafter jointly referred to as the “Consent Agreement and Final Order”) resolve Complainant’s civil penalty claims against Respondent under the Act for the violations alleged herein.
2. In accordance with 40 C.F.R. §§ 22.13(b) and 22.18(b)(2) and (3) of the Consolidated Rules of Practice, Complainant hereby simultaneously commences and resolves this administrative proceeding.

JURISDICTION

3. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (“EPA”) has jurisdiction over the above-captioned matter, as described in Paragraph 1, above.
4. The Consolidated Rules of Practice govern this administrative adjudicatory proceeding pursuant to 40 C.F.R. § 22.1(a)(1).

GENERAL PROVISIONS

5. For purposes of this proceeding only, Respondent admits the jurisdictional allegations set forth in this Consent Agreement and Final Order.
6. Except as provided in Paragraph 5, above, Respondent neither admits nor denies the specific factual allegations set forth in this Consent Agreement.
7. Respondent agrees not to contest the jurisdiction of EPA with respect to the execution of this Consent Agreement, the issuance of the attached Final Order, or the enforcement of this Consent Agreement and Final Order.
8. For purposes of this proceeding only, Respondent hereby expressly waives its right to contest the allegations set forth in this Consent Agreement and Final Order and waives its right to appeal the accompanying Final Order.
9. Respondent consents to the assessment of the civil penalty stated herein, to the issuance of any specified compliance order herein, and to any conditions specified herein.
10. The Parties shall bear their own costs and attorney's fees in connection with this proceeding, except where expressly provided otherwise herein.

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

11. In accordance with 40 C.F.R. §§ 22.13(b) and 22.18(b)(2) and (3) of the Consolidated Rules of Practice, Complainant alleges and adopts the Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law set forth immediately below.
12. At all times relevant to the violations alleged herein, Respondent was and is a limited liability company with its principal place of business located at 411 N. East Street, Carlisle, PA 17013.
13. Section 2(s) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(s), defines a "person" as "any individual, partnership, association, corporation, or any organized group of persons whether incorporated or not."
14. Respondent is a "person" as that term is defined in Section 2(s) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(s), and is subject to the assessment of civil penalties for the violations alleged herein.
15. Section 2(u) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(u), defines a "pesticide" in part, as "any substance or mixture of substances intended for preventing, destroying, repelling, or mitigating any pest."
16. Section 2(t) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(t), defines a "pest" as "any insect, rodent, nematode, fungus, weed, or any other form of terrestrial or aquatic plant or animal life or virus bacteria or other micro-organism (except viruses, bacteria, or other micro-

- organisms on or in living man or other living animals) which the Administrator declares to be a pest under [Section 25(c)(1)].”
17. Section 2(mm) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(mm), defines an “antimicrobial pesticide” as “(i) a pesticide that is intended to disinfect, sanitize, reduce, or mitigate growth or development of microbiological organisms; or (ii) protect inanimate objects, industrial processes or systems, surfaces, water, or other chemical substances from contamination, fouling, or deterioration caused by bacteria, viruses, fungi, protozoa, algae, or slime.”
 18. Section 2(gg) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(gg), defines “to distribute or sell” as “to distribute, sell, offer for sale, hold for distribution, hold for sale, hold for shipment, ship, deliver for shipment, release for shipment, or receive and (having so received) deliver or offer to deliver.” *See also* 40 C.F.R. § 152.3.
 19. Section 2(p) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(p), defines “label” as “the written, printed, or graphic matter on, or attached to, the pesticide or device or any of its containers or wrappers;” and defines “labeling” as “all labels and all other written, printed, or graphic matter – (A) accompanying the pesticide or device at any time; or (B) to which reference is made on the label or in literature accompanying the pesticide or device”
 20. Respondent sells cleaning and lawn products online at its website www.petratools.com (hereinafter referred to as the “Petra Tools Website”).
 21. On September 28, 2020, EPA became aware of Respondent offering for sale its ULV 500 and Neem Oil products with alleged pesticidal claims on the Petra Tools Website.
 22. On November 19, 2020, EPA issued an Advisory Letter to Respondent alerting the Respondent to potential violations under FIFRA including the alleged distribution and/or sale of unregistered pesticides.
 23. On December 1, 2020, Respondent responded to EPA’s November 19, 2020 Advisory Letter and informed EPA that it had removed the alleged pesticidal claims related to ULV500 and Neem Oil on the Petra Tools Website that were identified in the November 19, 2020 Advisory Letter; however, after further review, EPA determined that there were additional alleged pesticidal claims on the Petra Tools that had not been removed.
 24. On July 14, 2021, EPA sent an Information Request Letter (“IRL”) to Respondent.
 25. On August 19, 2021, Respondent responded to EPA’s IRL and provided EPA with requested sales records.
 26. On February 3, 2022, EPA issued Respondent a Notice of Potential Violation and Opportunity to Confer (“NOPVOC”).
 27. On March 28, 2022, EPA and Respondent had a NOPVOC meeting to discuss the alleged violations.

28. On August 25, 2022, EPA provided Respondent with a list of additional alleged pesticidal claims for the Neem Oil products that EPA found on the internet.

Count I
Distribution or Sale of Unregistered Pesticides

29. The information and allegations in the preceding paragraphs of this Consent Agreement are incorporated herein by reference.
30. Section 3(a) of FIFRA states, “[e]xcept as provided by this subchapter, no person in any State may distribute or sell to any person any pesticide that is not registered under this subchapter. . .” 7 U.S.C. § 136a(a).
31. Section 12(a)(1)(A) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136j(a)(1)(A), provides that it is unlawful for any person in any State to distribute or sell to any person any pesticide that is not registered under Section 3.
32. Pursuant to 40 C.F.R. § 152.15 (Pesticide Products Required to be Registered), “[a] substance is considered to be intended for a pesticidal purpose, and thus to be a pesticide requiring registration, if: (a) The person who distributes or sells the substance claims, states, or implies (by labeling or otherwise): (1) That the substance (either by itself or in combination with any other substance) can or should be used as a pesticide; or (2) the substance consists of or contains an active ingredient and that it can be used to manufacture a pesticide; or (b) The substance consists of or contains one or more active ingredients and has no significant commercially valuable use as distributed or sold other than (1) use for pesticidal purpose (by itself or in combination with any other substance), (2) use for manufacture of a pesticide; or (c) The person who distributes or sells the substance has actual or constructive knowledge that the substance will be used, or is intended to be used, for a pesticidal purpose.”
33. From at least October 30, 2020 to July 14, 2021, the Petra Tools Website contained the following alleged pesticidal claims for ULV 500 and the Ultimate Cleaning Kit (containing ULV500):
- a. *“nature’s most potent germ-killing disinfectant”*
 - b. *“defends your family against germs and viruses”*
 - c. *“nature’s most potent germ-killing disinfectant that’s 300x better than chlorine bleach”*
 - d. *“powerful disinfectant”*
 - e. *“disinfecting different surfaces”*
 - f. *“keep those household germs at bay so you, your family, & your employees can be safe from colds, flu, viruses, and other infectious diseases”*
 - g. *“best sanitizer”*

34. When accompanied by the alleged pesticidal claims identified in Paragraph 33 above, EPA alleges that Respondent's product ULV 500 is "a pesticide that is intended to (i) disinfect, sanitize, reduce, or mitigate growth or development of microbiological organisms; or (ii) protect inanimate objects, industrial processes or systems, surfaces, water, or other chemical substances from contamination, fouling, or deterioration caused by bacteria, viruses, fungi, protozoa, algae, or slime" and is, therefore, an antimicrobial pesticide under Section 2(mm) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(mm).
35. From at least February 27, 2021 to May 20, 2021 the Petra Tools Website and other websites contained the following alleged pesticidal claims for Neem Oil:
- a. *"frustrated with pesky bugs like aphids, gnats, and mites that hijack your plants? A few sprays of our neem oil will chase them all away! This all natural plant solution is lethal for over 200+ varieties of pests with its high azadirachtin content."*
 - b. *"the azadirachtin stopes (sic) insect (sic) from feeding on leaves and they will die in a few days after feeding on sprayed leafs (sic)"*
 - c. *"Ultra High Azadirachtin Content"*
 - d. *"potent and active elements to ensure that you are getting the best results for all kinds of neem oil uses"*
 - e. *"High azadirachtin content"*
 - f. *"ultra high standards of azadirachtin content for maximum effectiveness"*
 - g. *"good for all neem oil uses" "perfect for all kinds of neem oil uses"*
 - h. *"Great to use on" accompanying photo/wording for "vegetables"*
 - i. *"helps plants revive their health"*
 - j. *"highly effective in all its uses by retaining most of its nutrients"*
 - k. *"It's a powerful organic solution that is safe and efficiently gets rid of your most difficult-to-manage scenarios."*
 - l. *"inhibiting soil-based pathogens and nematodes which can attack the plant surface or burrow into the plant tissue causing damage to the root, stem, foliar (sic), or flower"*
 - m. *"protects your plants with efficient Azadirachtin."*
 - n. *Photo of cabbage with/without neem oil*
36. When accompanied by the alleged pesticidal claims identified in Paragraph 33 above, EPA alleges that Respondent's product Neem Oil is "a pesticide that is intended to (i) disinfect, sanitize, reduce, or mitigate growth or development of microbiological organisms; or (ii) protect inanimate objects, industrial processes or systems, surfaces, water, or other chemical substances from contamination, fouling, or deterioration caused by bacteria, viruses, fungi, protozoa, algae, or slime" and is, therefore, an antimicrobial pesticide under Section 2(mm) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(mm).
37. At all times relevant to the violations alleged herein, ULV500, the Ultimate Cleaning Kit and Neem Oil were not registered in accordance with Section 3 of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136a.

38. Sales Records provided by Respondent show that ULV 500 and the Ultimate Cleaning Kit were sold at least Five Hundred and Eighty-Four (584) times from at least October 30, 2020 and July 14, 2021.
39. From at least October 30, 2020 to July 14, 2021, Respondent distributed and/or sold, as that term is defined in Section 2(gg) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(gg), ULV 500 and the Ultimate Cleaning Kit on the Petra Tools Website.
40. Sales records provided by Respondent show that Neem Oil was sold at least Fifty-four (54) times from at least February 27, 2021 and July 14, 2021.
41. From at least February 27, 2021 to July 14, 2021, Respondent distributed and/or sold, as that term is defined in Section 2(gg) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136(gg), Neem Oil on the Petra Tools Website.
42. From at least October 30, 2020 to July 14, 2021, EPA alleges that Respondent violated Section 12(a)(1)(A) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136j(a)(1)(A) by distributing, selling, and/or offering for sale alleged unregistered pesticides.
43. In failing to comply with Section 12(a)(1)(A) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136j(a)(1)(A), EPA alleges that Respondent is subject to the assessment of penalties under Section 14(a) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136l(a).

CIVIL PENALTY

44. In settlement of EPA's claims for civil penalties for the violations alleged in this Consent Agreement, Respondent consents to the assessment of a civil penalty in the amount of One Hundred and Twenty-One Thousand Five Hundred and Seventy-Four Dollars (\$121,574), which Respondent shall be liable to pay in accordance with the terms set forth below.
45. The civil penalty is based upon EPA's consideration of a number of factors, including the penalty criteria ("statutory factors") set forth in Section 14(a)(4) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136l(a)(4), including, the following: the size of the business of the person charged, the effect of the person's ability to continue in business, and the gravity of the violation. These factors were applied to the particular facts and circumstances of this case with specific reference to EPA's *FIFRA Enforcement Response Policy* (December 2009) which reflects the statutory penalty criteria and factors set forth Section 14(a)(4) of FIFRA, 7 U.S.C. § 136l(a)(4), the appropriate *Adjustment of Civil Monetary Penalties for Inflation*, pursuant to 40 C.F.R. Part 19, and the applicable EPA memoranda addressing EPA's civil penalty policies to account for inflation.
46. Payment of the civil penalty amount, and any associated interest, administrative fees, and late payment penalties owed, shall be made by either cashier's check, certified check or electronic wire transfer, in the following manner:

- a. All payments by Respondent shall include reference to Respondent's name and address, and the Docket Number of this action, *i.e.*, **FIFRA-03-2023-0003**;
- b. All checks shall be made payable to the "United States Treasury"
- c. All payments made by check and sent by regular mail shall be addressed and mailed to:

- 47. Pursuant to 31 U.S.C. § 3717 and 40 C.F.R. § 13.11, EPA is entitled to assess interest and late payment penalties on outstanding debts owed to the United States and a charge to cover the costs of processing and handling a delinquent claim, as more fully described below. Accordingly, Respondent's failure to make timely payment of the penalty as specified herein shall result in the assessment of late payment charges including interest, penalties and/or administrative costs of handling delinquent debts.
- 48. Payment of the civil penalty is due and payable immediately upon receipt by Respondent of a true and correct copy of the fully executed and filed Consent Agreement and Final Order. Receipt by Respondent or Respondent's legal counsel of such copy of the fully executed Consent Agreement and Final Order, with a date stamp indicating the date on which the Consent Agreement and Final Order was filed with the Regional Hearing Clerk, shall constitute receipt of written initial notice that a debt is owed EPA by Respondent in accordance with 40 C.F.R. § 13.9(a).

49. INTEREST: In accordance with 40 C.F.R § 13.11(a)(1), interest on the civil penalty assessed in this Consent Agreement and Final Order will begin to accrue on the date Respondent is notified of its debt to the United States as established upon the ratification and filing of the fully executed Consent Agreement and Final Order with the Regional Hearing Clerk. However, EPA will not seek to recover interest on any amount of the civil penalties that is paid within thirty (30) calendar days after the date on which such interest begins to accrue. Interest will be assessed at the rate of the United States Treasury tax and loan rate in accordance with 40 C.F.R § 13.11(a).
50. ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS: The costs of EPA's administrative handling of overdue debts will be charged and assessed monthly throughout the period a debt is overdue. 40 C.F.R. § 13.11(b). Pursuant to Appendix 2 of EPA's *Resources Management Directives – Case Management*, Chapter 9, EPA will assess a \$15.00 administrative handling charge for administrative costs on unpaid penalties for the first thirty (30) day period after the payment is due and an additional \$15.00 for each subsequent thirty (30) days the penalty remains unpaid.
51. LATE PAYMENT PENALTY: A late payment penalty of six percent per year will be assessed monthly on any portion of the civil penalty that remains delinquent more than ninety (90) calendar days. 40 C.F.R. § 13.11(c). Should assessment of the penalty charge on the debt be required, it shall accrue from the first day payment is delinquent. 31 C.F.R. § 901.9(d).
52. Respondent agrees not to deduct for federal tax purposes the civil penalty assessed in this Consent Agreement and Final Order.

GENERAL SETTLEMENT CONDITIONS

54. By signing this Consent Agreement, Respondent acknowledges that this Consent Agreement and Final Order will be available to the public and represents that, to the best of Respondent's knowledge and belief, this Consent Agreement and Final Order does not contain any confidential business information or personally identifiable information from Respondent.
55. Respondent certifies that any information or representation it has supplied or made to EPA concerning this matter was, at the time of submission true, accurate, and complete and that there has been no material change regarding the truthfulness, accuracy or completeness of such information or representation. EPA shall have the right to institute further actions to recover appropriate relief if EPA obtains evidence that any information provided and/or representations made by Respondent to the EPA regarding matters relevant to this Consent Agreement and Final Order, including information about respondent's ability to pay a penalty, are false or, in any material respect, inaccurate.

This right shall be in addition to all other rights and causes of action that EPA may have, civil or criminal, under law or equity in such event. Respondent and its officers, directors and agents are aware that the submission of false or misleading information to the United States government may subject a person to separate civil and/or criminal liability.

CERTIFICATION OF COMPLIANCE

56. Respondent certifies to EPA, upon personal investigation and to the best of its knowledge and belief, that it currently is in compliance with regard to the violations alleged in this Consent Agreement.

OTHER APPLICABLE LAWS

57. Nothing in this Consent Agreement and Final Order shall relieve Respondent of its obligation to comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations, nor shall it restrict EPA's authority to seek compliance with any applicable laws or regulations, nor shall it be construed to be a ruling on the validity of any federal, state or local permit. This Consent Agreement and Final Order does not constitute a waiver, suspension or modification of the requirements of the FIFRA, or any regulations promulgated thereunder.

RESERVATION OF RIGHTS

58. This Consent Agreement and Final Order resolves only EPA's claims for civil penalties for the specific violations alleged against Respondent in this Consent Agreement and Final Order. EPA reserves the right to commence action against any person, including Respondent, in response to any condition which EPA determines may present an imminent and substantial endangerment to the public health, public welfare, or the environment. This settlement is subject to all limitations on the scope of resolution and to the reservation of rights set forth in Section 22.18(c) of the Consolidated Rules of Practice, 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(c). EPA reserves any rights and remedies available to it under FIFRA, the regulations promulgated thereunder and any other federal law or regulation to enforce the terms of this Consent Agreement and Final Order after its effective date.

EXECUTION /PARTIES BOUND

59. This Consent Agreement and Final Order shall apply to and be binding upon the EPA, the Respondent and the officers, directors, employees, contractors, successors, agents and assigns of Respondent. By his or her signature below, the person who signs this Consent Agreement on behalf of Respondent is acknowledging that he or she is fully authorized by the Respondent to execute this Consent Agreement and to legally bind Respondent to the terms and conditions of this Consent Agreement and Final Order.

EFFECTIVE DATE

60. The effective date of this Consent Agreement and Final Order is the date on which the Final Order, signed by the Regional Administrator of EPA, Region III, or his/her designee, the Regional Judicial Officer, is filed along with the Consent Agreement with the Regional Hearing Clerk pursuant to the Consolidated Rules of Practice.

ENTIRE AGREEMENT

61. This Consent Agreement and Final Order constitutes the entire agreement and understanding between the Parties regarding settlement of all claims for civil penalties pertaining to the specific violations alleged herein and there are no representations, warranties, covenants, terms, or conditions agreed upon between the Parties other than those expressed in this Consent Agreement and Final Order.

FINAL ORDER

Complainant, the Director of the Enforcement Compliance and Assurance Division, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region III, and Respondent, Outdoor Trading, LLC, have executed a document entitled “Consent Agreement,” which I hereby ratify as a Consent Agreement in accordance with the Consolidated Rules of Practice Governing the Administrative Assessment of Civil Penalties and the Revocation/Termination or Suspension of Permits (“Consolidated Rules of Practice”), 40 C.F.R. §§ 22.13(b) and 22.18(b)(2) and (3). The terms of the foregoing Consent Agreement are accepted by the undersigned and incorporated into this Final Order as if fully set forth at length herein.

Based upon the representations of the parties in the attached Consent Agreement, the penalty agreed to therein is based upon consideration of, *inter alia*, EPA’s *FIFRA enforcement Response Policy (December 2009)*, and the statutory factors set forth in Section 14(a)(1) of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act, 7 U.S.C. § 136l(a)(4).

NOW, THEREFORE, PURSUANT TO Section 14(a) of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act, 7 U.S.C. § 136l(a), and Section 22.18(b)(3) of the Consolidated Rules of Practice, **IT IS HEREBY ORDERED** that Respondent pay a civil penalty in the amount of **ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-ONE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-FOUR DOLLARS (\$121,574)**, in accordance with the payment provisions set forth in the Consent Agreement and in 40 C.F.R. § 22.31(c), and comply with the terms and conditions of the Consent Agreement.

This Final Order constitutes the final Agency action in this proceeding. This Final Order shall not in any case affect the right of the Agency or the United States to pursue appropriate injunctive or other equitable relief, or criminal sanctions for any violations of the law. This Final Order resolves only those causes of action alleged in the Consent Agreement and does not waive, extinguish or otherwise affect Respondent’s obligation to comply with all applicable provisions of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act, and the regulations promulgated thereunder.
