PROCEEDING PURSUANT TO SECTION 309(g)OF THE CLEAN WATER ACT, 33 U.S.C. § 1319(g), TO ASSESS CLASS II CIVIL PENALTY

ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLAINT, FINDINGS OF VIOLATION, NOTICE OF PROPOSED ASSESSMENT OF AN ADMINISTRATIVE PENALTY, AND NOTICE OF OPPORTUNITY TO REQUEST A HEARING

- I. Statutory and Regulatory Authorities
- 1. This Administrative Complaint, Findings of Violation, Notice of Proposed Assessment of a Civil Penalty, and Notice of Opportunity to Request a Hearing (Complaint) is issued under the authority vested in the Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) by Section 309(g)(2)(B) of the Clean Water Act ("CWA" or "Act"), 33 U.S.C. § 1319(g)(2)(B). The Administrator has delegated this authority to the Regional Administrator of EPA, Region 2, who in turn has delegated it to the Director, Caribbean Environmental Protection Division (CEPD) of EPA, Region 2 (Complainant).
- 2. Pursuant to Section 309(g)(2)(B) of the Act, and in accordance with the "Consolidated Rules of Practice Governing the Administrative Assessment of Civil Penalties, Issuance of Compliance or Corrective Action Orders, and the Revocation, Termination or Suspension of Permits" (CROP), 40 Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.) Part 22, a copy of which is attached, Complainant hereby requests that Regional Administrator assess a civil penalty against Metzgermeister & Research, Corp. (Respondent), as a result of Complainant's determination that the Respondent is in violation of Sections 301 and 402 of the Act, respectively, for its failure to apply for and obtain National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit coverage for its discharges of pollutants from its facility located in Ciales, Puerto Rico, and for its discharges of pollutants (storm water runoff associated with industrial activities) into waters of the United States without NPDES permit coverage.
- 3. Section 301(a) of the Act, provides in part that "[e]xcept as in compliance with

this Section and Sections ...402, and 404 of the Act, the discharge of any pollutant by any person shall be unlawful."

- 4. Section 308(a)(A) of the Act, establishes that whenever required to carry out the objective of the Act, the Administrator shall require the owner or operator of any point source to:
 - establish and maintain such records;
 - b. make such reports;
 - c. install, use and maintain such monitoring equipment or methods;
 - d. sample such effluents; and
 - e. provide such other information as may be required.
- 5. Section 402 of the Act, defines the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System "or NPDES" as the national program for, among other things, issuing and enforcing permits.
- Section 402 of the Act, authorizes the Administrator to issue a NPDES permit for the discharge of any pollutant, or combination of pollutants, subject to certain requirements of the Act and such conditions as the Administrator determines are necessary.
- 7. Section 402(p) of the Act, requires a permit with respect to a discharge associated with industrial activity.
- 8. Section 402 of the Act authorizes the Administrator to promulgate regulations for the implementation of the NPDES requirements.
- 9. Pursuant to the Act, on April 1, 1983, EPA promulgated regulations to implement the NPDES program, under EPA Administered Permit Programs: the NPDES, at 40 C.F.R. Part 122, as amended.
- Pursuant to the NPDES regulations at 40 C.F.R. § 122.5(b), the NPDES program requires permits for the discharge of any pollutant from any point source into waters of the United States.
- 11. Pursuant to the NPDES regulations at 40 C.F.R. § 122.26(a)(1)(ii) and § 122.26(b)(14), operators are required to obtain a NPDES permit for storm water discharges associated with industrial activity.
- 12. The Act and its implementing regulations and applicable NPDES permit contain the following definitions:

- a. "discharge of a pollutant" as any addition of any pollutant to navigable waters and/or waters of the United States from any point source. Section 502(12) of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1362(12), and 40 C.F.R. § 122.2;
- b. "facility" or "activity" as any NPDES point source or any other facility or activity (including land or appurtenances thereto) that is subject to the regulations of the NPDES program. 40 C.F.R. § 122.2;
- c. "industrial activity" as the 10 categories of industrial activities included in the definition of "storm water discharges associated with industrial activity" as defined in 40 C.F.R. §§ 122.26(b)(14)(i)-(ix) and (xi);
- d. "municipal separate storm sewer system" (MS4) is defined by 40 C.F.R. §§ 122.2 and 122.26(b)(8) as a conveyance or system of conveyances (including roads with drainage systems, municipal streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, man-made channels, or storm drains):
 - i. owned or operated by a State, city, town, borough, county, parish, district, association, or other public body (created by or pursuant to State law) having jurisdiction over disposal of sewage, industrial wastes, storm water, or other wastes, including special districts under State law such as a sewer district, flood control district or drainage district, or similar entity, or an Indian tribe or an authorized Indian tribal organization, or a designated and approved management agency under section 208 of the CWA that discharges to waters of the United States;
 - ii. designed or used for collecting or conveying storm water;
 - iii. which is not a combined sewer; and
 - iv. which is not part of a Publicly Owned Treatment Works (POTW) as defined at 40 C.F.R. 122.2.
- e. "navigable waters" as the waters of the United States, including the territorial seas. Section 502(7) of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1362(7); "Waters of the United States" means all waters such as lakes, rivers, streams (including intermittent streams), mudflats, sandflats, wetlands, among others, and their tributaries. 40 C.F.R. § 122.2;
- f. "owner" or "operator" as the owner or operator of any facility or activity subject to regulation under the NPDES program. 40 C.F.R. § 122.2;
- g. "operator" as any entity with a storm water discharge associated with industrial activity that meets either of the following two criteria as defined in Appendix A of the 2008 NPDES Multi-Sector General Permit for Storm Water Discharges Associated with Industrial Activity:

- the entity has operational control over industrial activities, including the ability to modify those activities; or
- ii. the entity has day-to-day operational control of activities at a facility necessary to ensure compliance with the permit (e.g., the entity is authorized to direct workers at a facility to carry out activities required by the permit).
- h. "person" as an individual, corporation, partnership or association. Section 502(5) of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1362(5), and 40 C.F.R. § 122.2;
- i. "point source" as any discernible, confined and discrete conveyance, including but not limited to any pipe, ditch, channel, tunnel, conduit, well, discrete fissure, container, rolling stock, concentrated animal feeding operation, or vessel or other floating craft, from which pollutants are or may be discharged. Section 502(14) of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1362(14), and 40 C.F.R. § 122.2;
- j. "pollutant" as including, among others, solid waste, dredged spoil, rock, sand, cellar dirt, sewage, sewage sludge and industrial, municipal and agricultural waste discharged into water. Section 502(6) of the CWA, 33 U.S.C. § 1362(6), and 40 C.F.R. § 122.2; and
- k. "storm water associated with industrial activity" means the discharge from any conveyance which is used for collecting and conveying storm water and which is directly related to manufacturing, processing or raw materials storage areas at an industrial plant. 40 C.F.R. §§ 122.2 and 122.26(b)(14).
- 14. On October 30, 2000, EPA issued the NPDES Storm Water Multi-Sector General Permit for Storm water Discharges Associated with Industrial Activity (2000 MSGP) pursuant to Section 402 of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1342. The 2000 MSGP became effective on October 30, 2000 and expired on October 30, 2005 but was administratively continued in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act and remained in force until September 2008.
- 15. On September 29, 2008, EPA re-issued the Multi-Sector General Permit for Storm water Discharges Associated with Industrial Activity (2008 MSGP). The 2008 MSGP became effective on September 29, 2008, and expires on September 29, 2013.
- 16. The 2000 and 2008 MSGPs establish among others, Notice of Intent (NOI) requirements, Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plans (SWPPP), monitoring, reporting and other conditions.

17. The 2000 and 2008 MSGPs require facilities who seek coverage under this permit to submit a complete NOI form in order to obtain authorization to discharge storm water associated with industrial activity.

II. Jurisdictional Findings

- 18. Respondent is a corporation organized and authorized to do business under the laws of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. This corporation is registered in the Puerto Rico Department of State under registration number 137878.
- 19. Respondent is a person within the meaning of Section 502(5) of the Act.
- 20. Respondent owns and operates a facility engaged in the meat processing and meat packaging (Facility).
- 21. At all relevant times to this Complaint, Respondent was the owner and operator of the Facility.
- 22. The Facility is located at State Road No. 149, Km. 15.5, Jaguas Ward, Ciales, Puerto Rico.
- 23. The industrial activities conducted by Respondent at the Facility consist of the meat processing and meat packing.
- 24. The Facility is best described by the Primary Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) code 2011 and the Secondary (SIC) code 2013.
- 25. Respondent's operations at the Facility are classified as an "industrial activity" as defined in 40 C.F.R. § 122.26(b)(14)(xi).
- 26. Respondent discharges storm water containing "pollutants" from the Facility into the Puente Creek, a tributary of Cialitos River which in turn discharges into the Manatí River which eventually discharges into the Atlantic Ocean.
- 27. The Puente Creek, Cialitos River, Manatí River and the Atlantic Ocean are waters of the United States, pursuant to Section 502(7) of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1362(7), and 40 C.F.R. § 122.2.
- 28. The Administrator of EPA promulgated regulations which require operators of facilities engaged in the manufacturing of prepare feeds and feed ingredients for animals and fowl, except dog food to apply for and obtain NPDES permit coverage for the discharges of storm water contaminated by contact with or that has come into contact with, any overburden, raw material, intermediate products, finished products, byproducts or waste products located on the site of such operations. These regulations are codified in 40 C.F.R. § 122.26(b)(14)(xi).

- 29. The EPA regulations at 40 C.F.R. § 122.26(e)(1)(i) require that operators of plants engaged in the manufacturing of prepare feeds and feed ingredients for animals and fowl, except dog food to obtain an NPDES permit under 40 C.F.R. § 122.26(a)(1), shall submit an individual NPDES permit application no later than October 1, 1992, if the facility is not part of a group application, as described in 40 C.F.R. § 122.26(c)(2), or is not authorized by an NPDES storm water general permit for industrial activities.
- 30. At all times relevant to this Complaint, Respondent's activities at the Facility have been covered by the above NPDES permit application regulations for industrial activities (2000 MSGP and 2008 MSGP).
- 31. Respondent is the owner/operator of the Facility, as defined in 40 C.F.R. § 122.2. Respondent is subject to the provisions of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1251, et seq., and the applicable NPDES permit application regulations found at 40 C.F.R. Part 122. Respondent was required to apply for and obtain NPDES permit coverage for the Facility's storm water discharges associated with industrial activities pursuant to 40 C.F.R. § 122.26(b)(14)(xi).

III. Findings of Violations

- 32. Complainant re-alleges Paragraphs 18-31 above.
- 33. On April 1, 2008, an EPA Region 2 enforcement officer conducted a Compliance Evaluation Inspection (Inspection) of the Facility. The purpose of the Inspection was to evaluate Respondent's compliance with the Act and the NPDES regulations.
- 34. The findings of the Inspection were summarized in the NPDES Water Compliance Inspection Report (Inspection Report), dated May 1, 2008.
- 35. The findings of the Inspection revealed, among others things, that:
 - a. the Facility has discharges consisting of process wastewaters from production areas and is connected to PRASA;
 - b. the Facility had and overflow of process wastewater from the grease traps due to a clog on the wastewater pipeline. The process wastewaters reached the storm sewer drain (Ciales MS4) located at the entrance of the Facility which discharges into the Puente Creek;
 - maintenance to the grease traps was performed by the facility personnel.
 The Facility did not keep a log book or records of the maintenance activities;
 - d. the Facility also discharges storm water directly into the Puente Creek;

- e. the Facility manufacturing area is inside an industrial building;
- f. the Facility is implementing best management practices (BMPs) to divert flows of wastewater of the trash dumpster from the storm water sewer; and
- g. The Facility did not have a NPDES Storm Water Multi Sector General permit for discharges of storm water associated with industrial activity at the time of the inspection.
- 36. On April 1, 2008, an EPA official reviewed the EPA Storm Water Notice of Intent Processing Center database and the EPA files located at EPA Region 2's Caribbean Environmental Protection Division (the "EPA Review") to determine if Respondent had obtained NPDES coverage for the Facility.
- 37. The Review revealed that Respondent had not filed an individual NPDES permit application, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 122.21, nor an NOI form seeking coverage under the 2000 and 2008 MSGPs for its discharges of pollutants from the Facility into waters of the United States.
- 38. Based on the observations made by EPA during the Inspection, EPA issued the Administrative Compliance Order CWA-02-2008-3150 (ACO), dated June 5, 2008, against Respondent to address the violations mentioned above. The Compliance Order incorporated findings of violations, and required Respondent to:
 - a. cease and desist the discharge of pollutants into waters of the United States;
 - b. submit a Compliance Plan to bring the Facility into compliance with the Act, which shall include, among other things:
 - development and implementation of best management practices;
 - ii. improvement of process wastewaters; and
 - iii. a detailed cost report.
 - c. submit a report stating the measures it had taken to permanently eliminate the discharges of pollutants from its Facility into waters of the United States; and
 - d. if Respondent determined that according to its operations it will be having discharges of pollutants into waters of the United States, it must submit and NPDES permit application.

- 39. On August 28, 2008, Respondent received the ACO.
- 40. On March 31, 2009, EPA issued a Show Cause Order (SCO), Docket Number CWA-02-2009-3126, ordering Respondent to comply with all ordered provisions of the ACO, file a NOI form within sixty (60) days of receipt of the SCO to seek coverage under the 2008 MSGP for its discharges of pollutants into waters of the United States, and to meet with EPA on April 20, 2009, to discuss why EPA should not refer this matter to the United States Department of Justice for commencement of civil and/or criminal actions as provided by the Act.
- 41. On April 6, 2009, Respondent received the SCO.
- 42. Respondent did not file a NOI form to obtain coverage under the 2008 MSGP within sixty (60) days of receipt of the SCO (by June 5, 2009) as required by the SCO.
- 43. On November 14, 2011, an EPA enforcement officer conducted a Compliance Evaluation Inspection (2nd Inspection) of the Facility. The purpose of the Inspection was to evaluate Respondent's compliance with the Act and the NPDES regulations.
- 44. The findings of the 2nd Inspection were summarized in the NPDES Water Compliance Inspection Report (the "2nd Report") dated January 18, 2012.
- 45. The following was observed during the 2nd Inspection:
 - a. Respondent had failed to implemented the minimum requirements of the SWPPP according to Part 5 of the 2008 MSGP;
 - b. BMPs had not been selected, installed, and maintained as required by Part 2.1 of the 2008 MSGP;
 - c. exposed areas of the facility were not kept in a clean, orderly manner where such exposed areas could contribute pollutants to storm water discharges especially around grease drums storage area where lack of good housekeeping was observed as required by Part 2.1.2 of the 2008 MSGP;
 - d. industrial materials and activities were not protected from exposure to rain as required by Part 2.1.2.1 of the 2008 MSGP;
 - e. timely inspections and maintenance of storm water management devices as well as inspecting, testing, maintaining and repairing facility equipment and systems to avoid breakdowns or failures that may result in discharges of pollutants to surface waters were not achieved as part of a preventive maintenance program required by Part 2.1.2.3 of the 2008 MSGP;

- and systems to avoid breakdowns or failures that may result in discharges of pollutants to surface waters were not achieved as part of a preventive maintenance program required by Part 2.1.2.3 of the 2008 MSGP;
- f. industrial equipment spills and leaks were not being address adequately as required by Part 2.1.2.4 of the 2008 MSGP; and
- g. structural BMPs to manage runoff were not observed as required by Part 2.1.2.6 of the 2008 MSGP.
- 46. On December 13, 2011, an EPA official conducted a review of the EPA files (2nd Review) in order to verify Respondent's compliance with the Act and the applicable NPDES regulations.
- 47. The 2nd Review revealed that Respondent failed to submit an individual NPDES permit application, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 122.21, or a NOI form for coverage under an NPDES general permit as required by 40 C.F.R. § 122.28 or in the alternative, a No Exposure Certification exclusion from permitting under 40 C.F.R. § 122.26(g), for its discharges of pollutants from the Facility into waters of the United States.
- 48. On January 24, 2012, EPA issued Administrative Order CWA-02-2012-3104 (the "2nd ACO") against Respondent to address the violations mentioned above.
- 49. The 2nd ACO incorporated findings of violations, and ordered Respondent to, among other things, cease and desist the discharge of pollutants associated with its industrial activities from the Facility into waters of the United States and to submit a compliance plan that addressed the deficiencies found during the 2nd Inspection and 2nd Review.
- 50. On February 28, 2012, Respondent received the 2nd ACO.
- 51. On May 23, 2012, EPA issued a non compliance letter to Respondent for its failure to address the 2nd ACO.
- 52. On January 28, 2013, an EPA official reviewed the EPA Storm Water Notice of Intent Processing Center database and the EPA files located at EPA Region 2's Caribbean Environmental Protection Division (the "3rd Review") to determine if Respondent had obtained NPDES coverage for the Facility.
- 53. The review revealed that Respondent failed to file an individual NPDES permit application, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 122.21, or an NOI form seeking coverage under the 2008 MSGP for its discharges of pollutants from the Facility into waters of the United States.
- 54. As of the date of issuance of this enforcement action, Respondent continues to be in violation of the Act, NPDES regulations and the 2nd ACO.

- 55. Based on the findings on paragraphs 32-55 above, Respondent is liable for the violations of Sections 301(a) and 402(a) of the Act, 33 U.S.C. §§ 1311(a) and 1342(a), as specified below:
 - a. Claim 1 Failure to apply for and obtain NPDES permit coverage. Respondent did not submit an individual NPDES permit application as required by 40 C.F.R. § 122.21, nor did it file a complete and accurate NOI form seeking coverage under the 2008 MSGP from January 5, 2009 (deadline to submit an NOI form seeking 2008 MSGP coverage) to January 28, 2013 (date when EPA review the NOI database to verify Respondent's compliance with the Act and the applicable NPDES regulations and submit a complete NOI form seeking coverage under the 2008 MSGP). The number of days that Respondent failed to file for NPDES coverage is 1485 days.
 - b. Claim 2 Illegal discharges of pollutant (storm water associated with its industrial activities) into waters of the United States without NPDES permit coverage. Respondent discharged pollutants from the Facility into waters of the United States without NPDES permit coverage from January 5, 2009 (deadline to submit an NOI form seeking 2008 MSGP coverage) to January 28, 2013 (date when EPA review the NOI database to verify Respondent's compliance with the Act and the applicable NPDES regulations and submit a complete NOI form seeking coverage under the 2008 MSGP). The number of days that Respondent failed to file for NPDES coverage is 1485 days.

The EPA will notify the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico regarding this proposed action by mailing a copy of this Complaint and Notice and offering an opportunity for the Commonwealth to confer with EPA on the proposed penalty assessment.

IV. Notice of Proposed Order Assessing a Civil Penalty

Based on the foregoing Findings of Violation, and pursuant to the authority of Section 309(g) of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1319(g), EPA, Region 2 hereby proposes to issue a Final Order Assessing Administrative Penalties (Final Order) to Respondent assessing a penalty of \$177,500. The proposed penalty has been determined in accordance with the applicable factors under Section 309(g)(3) of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1319(g)(3). EPA is required to take in consideration the nature, circumstances, extent and gravity of the violation (or violations), and Respondent's prior compliance history, degree of culpability, economic benefit or savings accruing to Respondent by virtue of the violations, and Respondent's ability to pay the proposed penalty. EPA has also taken in consideration the Federal Civil Penalties Inflation Adjustment Act of 1990, as amended by the Debt Collection Improvement Act of 1996, which requires EPA to adjust penalties for inflation on a periodic basis.

Based on the Findings set forth above, Respondent has been found to have violated in numerous occasions the NPDES regulations and the Act. Respondent failed to apply for NPDES permit coverage by January 5, 2009, as required by the 2008 MSGP. Respondent is culpable for the violations. EPA took into account Respondent's knowledge of the NPDES regulations, the 2008 MSGP, and the risks to human health and the environment posed by the uncontrolled discharges of storm water runoff from the Facility into the Atlantic Ocean, a water of the United Sates.

The violations discussed in this Complaint are serious since Respondent's failure to develop and implement storm water pollution prevention at the Project caused a potential amount of pollutants to reach surface water that could cause direct and indirect negative effects on human health and the environment. Respondent knew of their obligations under the NPDES regulations, Multi-sector General Permit, and the Act. Respondent has a prior history of violations under the NPDES program. EPA may issue a final Order Assessing Administrative Penalties thirty (30) days after Respondent's receipt of this Notice, unless Respondent, within that time files an answer to the Complaint and, requests a hearing on this Notice pursuant to the following section.

V. <u>Procedures Governing This Administrative Litigation</u>

The rules of procedure governing this civil administrative litigation have been set forth in the CROP, which have been codified at 40 C.F.R. Part 22. A copy of these rules accompanies this Complaint.

A. Answering the Complaint

Where Respondent intend to contest any material fact upon which the Complaint is based, to contend that the proposed penalty is inappropriate or to contend that Respondent is entitled to judgment as a matter of law, Respondent must file with the Regional Hearing Clerk of EPA, Region 2, both an original and one copy of a written Answer to the Complaint, and such Answer must be filed within thirty (30) days after service of the Complaint. 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(a). The address of the Regional Hearing Clerk of EPA, Region 2, is:

Respondent shall also then serve one copy of the Answer to the Complaint upon Complainant and any other party to the action. 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(a).

Respondent's Answer to the Complaint must clearly and directly admit, deny, or explain each of the factual allegations that are contained in the Complaint and with regard to which Respondent has any knowledge. 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(b). Where Respondent lacks

knowledge of a particular factual allegation and so states in its Answer, the allegation is deemed denied. 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(b). The Answer shall also set forth: (1) the circumstances or arguments that are alleged to constitute the grounds of defense, (2) the facts that Respondent dispute (and thus intends to place at issue in the proceeding), (3) the basis for opposing the proposed relief, and (4) whether Respondent requests a hearing. 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(b).

Respondent's failure to affirmatively raise in the Answer facts that constitute or that might constitute the grounds of its defense may preclude Respondent, at a subsequent stage in this proceeding, from raising such facts and/or from having such facts admitted into evidence at a hearing.

B. Opportunity to Request a Hearing

If requested by Respondent in the Answer, a hearing upon the issues raised by the Complaint and Answer may be held. 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(c). If, however, Respondent does not request a hearing, the Presiding Officer (as defined in 40 C.F.R. § 22.3) may hold a hearing if the Answer raises issues appropriate for adjudication. 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(c).

Any hearing in this proceeding will be held at a location determined in accordance with 40 C.F.R. § 22.21(d). A hearing of this matter will be conducted in accordance with the applicable provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, 5 U.S.C. §§ 551-59, and the procedures set forth in Subpart D of 40 C.F.R. Part 22.

Should Respondent request a hearing on this proposed penalty assessment, members of the public, to whom EPA is obligated to give notice of this proposed action, will have a right under Section 309(g)(4)(B) of the Act, to be heard and to present evidence on the appropriateness of the penalty assessment. Should Respondent not request a hearing, EPA will issue a Final Order, and only members of the public who submit timely comment on this proposal will have an additional thirty (30) days to petition EPA to set aside the Final Order and to hold a hearing thereon. EPA will grant the petition and will hold a hearing only if the petitioner's evidence is material and was not considered by EPA in the issuance of the Final Order.

C. Failure to Answer

If Respondent fails in the Answer to admit, deny, or explain any material factual allegation contained in the Complaint, such failure constitutes an admission of the allegation. 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(d). If Respondent fails to file a timely [i.e., in accordance with the 30-day period set forth in 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(a)] Answer to the Complaint, Respondent may be found in default upon motion. 40 C.F.R. § 22.17(a). Default by Respondent constitutes, for purposes of the pending proceeding only, an admission of all facts alleged in the Complaint and a waiver of Respondent's right to contest such factual allegations. 40 C.F.R. § 22.17(a). Following a default by Respondent for a

failure to timely file an Answer to the Complaint, any order issued therefore shall be issued pursuant to 40 C.F.R. § 22.17(c).

Any penalty assessed in the default order shall become due and payable by Respondent without further proceedings thirty (30) days after the Default Order becomes final pursuant to 40 C.F.R. § 22.27(c). 40 C.F.R. § 22.17(d). If necessary, EPA may then seek to enforce such Final Order of Default against Respondent, and to collect the assessed penalty amount, in federal court.

VI. Informal Settlement Conference

Whether or not Respondent requests a formal hearing, EPA encourages settlement of this proceeding consistent with the provisions of the Act and its applicable regulations. 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(b). At an informal conference with a representative(s) of Complainant, Respondent may comment on the charges made in this complaint, and Respondent may also provide whatever additional information that it believes is relevant to the disposition of this matter, including: (1) actions Respondent has taken to correct any or all of the violations herein alleged, (2) any information relevant to Complainant's calculation of the proposed penalty, (3) the effect the proposed penalty would have on Respondent's ability to continue in business, and/or (4) any other special facts or circumstances Respondent wishes to raise.

Complainant has the authority to modify the amount of the proposed penalty, where appropriate, to reflect any settlement agreement reached with Respondent, to reflect any relevant information previously not known to Complainant or to dismiss any or all of the charges, if Respondent can demonstrate that the relevant allegations are without merit and that no cause of action as herein alleged exists. Respondent is referred to 40 C.F.R. § 22.18.

Any request for an informal conference or any questions that Respondent may have regarding this Complaint should be directed to the EPA attorney named in Section VIII, Paragraph 2, below.

The parties may engage in settlement discussions irrespective of whether Respondent has requested a hearing. 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(b)(1). Respondent's requesting a formal hearing do not prevent him from also requesting an informal settlement conference; the informal conference procedure may be pursued simultaneously with the formal adjudicatory hearing procedure. A request for an informal settlement conference constitutes neither an admission nor a denial of any of the matters alleged in the Complaint. Complainant does not deem a request for an informal settlement conference as a request for a hearing as specified in 40 C.F.R. § 22.15(c).

A request for an informal settlement conference does not affect Respondent's obligation to file a timely Answer to the Complaint pursuant to 40 C.F.R. § 22.15. No penalty

reduction, however, will be made simply because an informal settlement conference is held.

Any settlement that may be reached as a result of an informal settlement conference shall be embodied in a written Consent Agreement. 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(b)(2). In accepting the Consent Agreement, Respondent waives his right to contest the allegations in the Complaint and waives any right to appeal the Final Order that is to accompany the Consent Agreement. 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(b)(2). In order to conclude the proceeding, a Final Order ratifying the parties' agreement to settle will be executed. 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(b)(3).

Respondent's entering into a settlement through the signing of such Consent Agreement and its complying with the terms and conditions set forth in such Consent Agreement terminates this administrative litigation and the civil proceedings arising out of the allegations made in the Complaint. Respondent's entering into a settlement does not extinguish, waive, satisfy or otherwise affect its obligation and responsibility to comply with all applicable statutory and regulatory requirements, and to maintain such compliance.

VII. Resolution of this Proceeding Without Hearing or Conference

Instead of filing an Answer, Respondent may choose to pay the total amount of the proposed penalty within 30 days after receipt of the Complaint, provided that Respondent files with the Regional Hearing Clerk, Region 2 (at the address noted above), a copy of the check or other instrument of payment. 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(a). A copy of the check or other instrument of payment should be provided to the EPA Assistant Regional Counsel identified on Section VIII, paragraph 2. Payment of the penalty assessed should be made by sending a cashier's or certified check payable to the "Treasurer, United States of America", in the full amount of the penalty assessed in this complaint to the following addressee:

Pursuant to 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(a)(3), if Respondent elects to pay the full amount of the penalty proposed in the Complaint within thirty (30) days of receiving the Complaint, then, upon EPA's receipt of such payment, the Regional Administrator of EPA, Region 2 (or, if designated, the Regional Judicial Officer), shall issue a Final Order in accordance with 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(a)(3). In accordance with 40 C.F.R. § 22.45(c)(3), no Final Order shall issue until at least ten (10) days after the close of the comment period on this Compliant. Issuance of a Final Order terminates this administrative litigation and the

with all applicable statutory and regulatory requirements, and to maintain such compliance.

- 1. Respondent has a right to be represented by an attorney at any stage of these proceedings.
- 2. This Complaint does not constitute a waiver, suspension or modification of the requirements of the Act, regulations promulgated thereunder, or any applicable permit.
- 3. Neither assessment nor payment of an administrative civil penalty pursuant to Section 309(g) of the Act will affect Respondent's continuing obligation to comply with the Act, and with any separate Compliance Order issued under Section 309(a) of the Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1319(a), for the violations alleged herein.
