CONSENT AGREEMENT

A. PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

1. This is an administrative penalty assessment proceeding brought under Section 113(d) of the Clean Air Act (the "Act"), 42 U.S.C. § 7413(d), and Sections 22.13 and 22.18 of the Consolidated Rules of Practice Governing Administrative Assessment of Civil Penalties and the Revocation/Termination or Suspension of Permits ("Consolidated Rules"), as codified at 40 C.F.R. Part 22.
2. Complainant is the United States Environmental Protection Agency, Region 4. On the EPA's behalf, the Director of the Air, Pesticides and Toxics Management Division, the EPA Region 4, is delegated the authority to settle civil administrative penalty proceedings under Section 113(d) of the Act.
3. Respondent is The Eggo Company, a corporation doing business in the State of Tennessee. Respondent is a "person" as defined in Section 302(e) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 7602(e).
4. Complainant and Respondent, having agreed that settlement of this action is in the public interest, consent to the entry of this consent agreement ("Consent Agreement" or "Agreement") and the attached final order ("Final Order" or "Order") without adjudication of any issue of law or fact herein, and Respondent agrees to comply with the terms of this Consent Agreement and Final Order.

B. JURISDICTION

5. This Consent Agreement is entered into under Section 113(d) of the Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7413(d), and the Consolidated Rules, 40 C.F.R. Part 22. The alleged violations in this Consent Agreement are pursuant to Section 112(r)(7) of the Act.
6. The EPA and the United States Department of Justice jointly determined that this matter, although it involves alleged violations that occurred more than one year before initiation of this proceeding, is appropriate for an administrative penalty assessment. 42 U.S.C. § 7413(d); 40 C.F.R. § 19.4.
7. On April 22, 2016, the EPA issued to Respondent a notice of potential violation ("NOPV"), providing notice that the EPA found that the Respondent potentially committed the alleged violations described in Section E of this Agreement and providing Respondent an opportunity to confer with the EPA. On June 29, 2016, August 19, 2016 and on August 30, 2016, representatives of the Respondent and the EPA discussed the April 22, 2016 NOPV.

8. The Regional Judicial Officer is authorized to ratify this Consent Agreement which memorializes settlement between the Complainant and Respondent. 40 C.F.R. §§ 22.4(b) and 22.18(b).

9. The issuance of this Consent Agreement and attached Final Order simultaneously commences and concludes this proceeding. 40 C.F.R. § 22.13(b).

C. GOVERNING LAW

10. Respondent operates a “stationary source” as that term is defined by Section 302(z) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 7602(z). The Respondent’s stationary source is located at 585 Morrison Road, Rossville, Tennessee 38066 (stationary source).

11. Section 112(r) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 7412(r), addresses the prevention of releases of substances listed pursuant to Section 112(r)(3) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 7412(r)(3). The purpose of this section is to prevent the accidental release of extremely hazardous substances and to minimize the consequences of such releases. Pursuant to Section 112(r)(7) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 7412(r)(7), the EPA is authorized to promulgate regulations for accidental release prevention.

12. Pursuant to Sections 112(r)(3) and 112(r)(7) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 7412(r)(3) and 7412(r)(7), the EPA promulgated rules codified at 40 C.F.R. Part 68, Chemical Accident Prevention Provisions. These regulations are collectively referred to as the “Risk Management Program” (RMProgram) and apply to an owner or operator of a stationary source that has a threshold quantity of a regulated substance in a process. Pursuant to Sections 112(r)(3) and 112(r)(5) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 7412(r)(3) and 7412(r)(5), the list of regulated substances and threshold levels are codified at 40 C.F.R. § 68.130.

13. Pursuant to Section 112(r)(7)(B)(iii) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 7412(r)(7)(B)(iii), and 40 C.F.R. §§ 68.10 and 68.150, the owner or operator of a stationary source that has a regulated substance in an amount equal to or in excess of the applicable RMProgram threshold in a “process” as defined in 40 C.F.R. § 68.3, must develop an RMProgram accidental release prevention program, and register a single Risk Management Plan (RMPlan) with the EPA.

D. FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

14. Respondent has registered an RMPlan with the EPA for its stationary source, and has developed an RMProgram accidental release prevention program for the stationary source.

15. For the purpose of this Agreement:

(a) At its stationary source, the Respondent owns and operates an ammonia refrigeration process, which is an RMProgram level 3 regulated process that stores or otherwise uses anhydrous ammonia in an amount exceeding its applicable threshold of 10,000 pounds.

(b) At its stationary source, the Respondent currently has on-site for use a maximum of 95,000 pounds of anhydrous ammonia for cooling and freezing capabilities for its Eggo waffle products.

(c) On August 20, 2013, the EPA conducted an on-site inspection of the RMProgram related records and equipment for the purpose of assessing the Respondent's compliance with the RMProgram requirements and the implemented recognized and generally accepted good engineering practices (RAGAGEP) for the covered process at its stationary source.

(d) The Respondent could not provide the requested documentation certifying that the ammonia refrigeration equipment complied with the following industry standards: American Society of Heating, Refrigerating, and Air Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE); the American National Standards Institute (ANSI); and the International Institute of Ammonia Refrigeration (IIAR).

(e) The Respondent could not provide the requested documentation to demonstrate that refresher training was provided, every three years or more often if necessary, to the employees involved in operating the ammonia refrigeration process at the facility.

(f) At the time of inspection, the Respondent could not demonstrate that they had performed a pre-startup safety review when significant modifications were made to the ammonia refrigeration process that required a change in the process safety information.

(g) The Respondent could not provide the requested information to demonstrate that they promptly determined and documented an appropriate response to several findings in the compliance audit dated May 2-3, 2012.

(h) At the time of inspection, the Respondent could not demonstrate that they reviewed incident investigation reports with all affected personnel whose job tasks were relevant to the incident findings.

(i) At the time of inspection, the Respondent could not demonstrate that they provided employees access to the process hazard analyses and to all other information required to be developed under the chemical accident prevention rule.

(j) At the time of inspection, the Respondent could not demonstrate that they developed and implemented safe work practices at the facility, consistent with 40 C.F.R. § 68.69(d), to provide for the control of the entrance, presence, and exit of the contract owner operator and contract employees in the covered process areas.

(k) At the time of inspection, the Respondent could not demonstrate that they periodically evaluated the performance of contract owners or operators in fulfilling their obligations.

E. ALLEGED VIOLATIONS OF LAW

16. Based on the facts stipulated in Section D above, the EPA alleges that the Respondent violated the codified rules of 40 C.F.R. Part 68, governing the Act's Chemical Accident Prevention Provisions when it failed to:

(a) Document that equipment complies with recognized and generally accepted good engineering practices, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 68.65(d)(2);

(b) Provide refresher training at least every three years, or more often if necessary, to each employee involved in operating the ammonia refrigeration RMprogram level 3 process to assure that employees understand and adhere to the current operating procedures of the process, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 68.71(b);

(c) Perform a pre-startup safety review prior to the introduction of a regulated substance into a process, if a new stationary source is installed or an existing source is significantly modified, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 68.77(a);

(d) Promptly determine and document an appropriate response to each of the findings of the compliance audit and document that deficiencies have been corrected, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 68.79(d);

(e) Review incident investigation reports with all affected personnel whose job tasks are relevant to the incident findings, including contract employees where applicable, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 68.81(f);

(f) Provide employees access to process hazards analyses and to all other information required to be developed under the chemical accident prevention rule, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 68.83(c);

(g) Develop and implement safe work practices consistent with 40 C.F.R. § 68.69(d), to control the entrance, presence, and exit of the contract owner or operator and contract employees in the covered process area, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 68.87(b)(4); and

(h) Periodically evaluate the performance of contract owners or operators in fulfilling their obligations, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 68.87(b)(5).

F. TERMS OF CONSENT AGREEMENT

17. For the purpose of this proceeding, as required by 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(b)(2), Respondent:

- (a) admits that the EPA has jurisdiction over the subject matter alleged in this Agreement;
- (b) neither admits nor denies the factual allegations stated above;
- (c) consents to the assessment of a civil penalty as stated below;
- (d) consents to the conditions specified in this Agreement;
- (e) waives any rights to contest the alleged violations of law set forth in Section E of this Consent Agreement;
- (f) waives its rights to appeal the Order accompanying this Agreement; and

18. For the purpose of this Agreement, Respondent:

- (a) agrees that this Agreement states a claim upon which relief may be granted against Respondent;
- (b) acknowledges that this Agreement constitutes an enforcement action for purposes of considering Respondent's compliance history in any subsequent enforcement actions;
- (c) waives any and all remedies, claims for relief and otherwise available rights to judicial or administrative review that Respondent may have with respect to any issue of fact or law set forth in this Order, including any right to judicial review under Section 307(b)(1) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 7607(b)(1);
- (d) consents to personal jurisdiction in any action to enforce this Agreement or Order, or both, in the United States District Court for the Western District of Tennessee;
- (e) waives any rights it may possess at law or in equity to challenge the authority of the EPA to bring a civil action in a United States District Court to compel compliance with the Agreement or Order, or both, and to seek an additional penalty for such noncompliance, and agrees that federal law shall govern in any such civil action; and
- (f) certifies that as of its execution of this Agreement, to the best of its knowledge, it is in compliance with all relevant requirements of 40 C.F.R. Part 68.

19. Penalty Payment. Respondent agrees to:

- (a) pay the civil penalty of **ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$133,000)** (“EPA Penalty”) within 30 calendar days of the Effective Date of this Agreement;
- (b) pay the EPA Penalty by forwarding a cashier's or certified check payable to the “Treasurer, United States of America,” or by electronic transfer to one of the following addresses:

Within 24 hours of payment of the EPA Penalty, send a separate copy of the check or confirmation of electronic transfer, and a written statement that payment has been made in accordance with this Agreement, to the following persons at the following addresses:

20. If Respondent fails to timely pay any portion of the penalty assessed under this Agreement, the EPA may:

- (a) request the Attorney General to bring a civil action in an appropriate district court to recover: the amount assessed; interest at rates established pursuant to 26 U.S.C. § 6621(a)(2); the United States' enforcement expenses; and a 10 percent quarterly nonpayment penalty, 42 U.S.C. § 7413(d)(5);
- (b) refer the debt to a credit reporting agency or a collection agency, 42 U.S.C. § 7413(d)(5), 40 C.F.R. §§ 13.13, 13.14, and 13.33;
- (c) collect the debt by administrative offset (i.e., the withholding of money payable by the United States to, or held by the United States for, a person to satisfy the debt the person owes the Government), which includes, but is not limited to, referral to the Internal Revenue Service for offset against income tax refunds, 40 C.F.R. Part 13, Subparts C and H; and
- (d) suspend or revoke Respondent's licenses or other privileges, or suspend or disqualify Respondent from doing business with the EPA or engaging in programs the EPA sponsors or funds, 40 C.F.R. § 13.17.

21. By signing this Agreement, Respondent acknowledges that this Agreement and Order will be available to the public and agrees that this Agreement does not contain any confidential business information or personally identifiable information.

22. By signing this Agreement, the undersigned representative of Complainant and the undersigned representative of Respondent each certify that he or she is fully authorized to execute and enter into terms and conditions of this Agreement and has the legal capacity to bind the party he or she represents to this Agreement.

23. By signing this Agreement, both parties agree that each party's obligations under this Consent Agreement and attached Final Order constitute sufficient consideration for the other party's obligations.

24. By signing this Agreement, Respondent certifies that the information it has supplied concerning this matter was at the time of submission true, accurate, and complete for each such submission, response, and statement. Respondent acknowledges that there are significant penalties for submitting false or misleading information, including the possibility of fines and imprisonment for knowing submission of such information, under 18 U.S.C. § 1001.

25. Except as qualified by Paragraph 20, each party shall bear its own attorney's fees, costs, and disbursements incurred in this proceeding.

G. EFFECT OF CONSENT AGREEMENT AND ATTACHED FINAL ORDER

26. In accordance with 40 C.F.R. § 22.18(c), completion of the terms of this Consent Agreement and

Final Order resolves only Respondent's liability for federal civil penalties for the violations relating to the facts specifically alleged above.

27. Penalties paid pursuant to this Agreement shall not be deductible for purposes of federal taxes.

28. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and understanding of the parties and supersedes any prior agreements or understandings, whether written or oral, among the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof.

29. The terms, conditions, and compliance requirements of this Agreement may not be modified or amended except upon written agreement of both parties, and approval of the Regional Judicial Officer.

30. Any violation of this Order may result in a civil judicial action for an injunction or civil penalties as provided in Section 113(b)(2) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 7413(b)(2), as well as criminal sanctions as provided in Section 113(c) of the Act, 42 U.S.C. § 7413(c). The EPA may use any information submitted under this Order in an administrative, civil judicial, or criminal action.

31. Nothing in this Agreement shall relieve Respondent of the duty to comply with all applicable provisions of the Act and other federal, state, or local laws or statutes, nor shall it restrict the EPA's authority to seek compliance with any applicable laws or regulations, nor shall it be construed to be a ruling on, or determination of, any issue related to any federal, state, or local permit.

32. Nothing herein shall be construed to limit the power of the EPA to undertake any action against Respondent or any person in response to conditions that may present an imminent and substantial endangerment to the public health, welfare, or the environment.

33. The EPA reserves the right to revoke this Agreement and settlement penalty if and to the extent that the EPA finds, after signing this Agreement, that any information provided by Respondent was materially false or inaccurate at the time such information was provided to the EPA, and the EPA reserves the right to assess and collect any and all civil penalties for any alleged violation described herein. The EPA shall give Respondent notice of its intent to revoke, which shall not be effective until received by Respondent in writing.


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H. EFFECTIVE DATE






