The facility produces golf carts (GC), recreational water vehicles (WV), and all-terrain vehicles (ATV).The main manufacturing operations include material handling and storage, metal fabrications (stamping, cutting and welding), fiberglass molding, plastics injection molding, urethane foaming, plastic component buffing and drilling, parts cleaning, electrostatic deposition base coating and powder top coating for metal parts, surface preparation and spray coating for plastic parts, and final vehicle assembly and testing.

- 2000 Air and Waste Management Association GA Chapter Environmental Awards (Certificate of Achievement) - Yamaha has made significant progress in pollution source reduction and process efficiency improvements, which have yielded impressive environmental gains.
- 2001 Air and Waste Management Association GA Chapter Environmental Awards - Yamaha Motor Manufacturing Corp. was recognized for their Pollution Prevention/ Waste Minimization efforts, which include: Replacement of solvent-based metal coating processes with electrostatic deposition base coat and powder top coat processes, resulting in reductions in VOC emissions of 30 tpy, reduced wastewater treatment requirements and elimination of lead from the plant's waste stream; Implementation of a distillation system yielding a 73% reduction (25,500 gallons/yr) of Methyl Ethyl Ketone (MEK) and paint hazardous waste, with an annual savings of \$126,000; Landfilled solid waste per vehicle manufactured has been reduced by 40%, with the associated cost savings earmarked for community improvement activities, employee re-enforcement, and funding for further waste reduction and recycling activities.
- Yamaha uses money collected from the sale of our recyclable items to fund our 33% Program. Annually we take a third of this money to fund community programs. We offer \$500 grants to local schools in the Coweta county area for environmental projects. To date this program has benefited over 3000 local school children per year. We fund a photography program with the Georgia High Program. We also support Adopt a Stream, 4H, and March of Dimes. We take another third to support employee reinforcement programs. We fund ten \$2000 scholarships to college students of employees in our Environmental Education Scholarship Fund. We also fund the annual Safety Day cookout in June and disperse environmental literature along with a safety gift. In the past we have distributed roadside emergency kits, fire extinguishers, first aid kits and carbon monoxide alarms. The last third of the money is used for expenses to develop and sustain the program. In the past we have purchased recycling containers and a plastics bailer.
- We also conduct business outreach. We partnered with the Georgia State P2AD and conducted a training and mentoring session on ISO 14001 and EMS programs. We also participate in the Keep Georgia Beautiful Program.
