





SUBJECT: Additional Source Material Pertaining to Update for the National Capacity Assessment pursuant to CERCLA 104(c)(9)

For the purposes of ensuring that the requirements of CERCLA 104(c)(9) are met, EPA's Office of Solid Waste has determined that there will be adequate national capacity through 2019, with the effect that all States will continue to be eligible to receive Superfund Trust funds. OSW analyzed changes in capacity availability and hazardous waste demand for all Capacity Assurance Planning management categories, and found that there continues to be adequate national capacity in all categories. The analysis was based upon information consisting of targeted surveys, listings studies, treatment variance analyses, information from industry, Regulatory Impact Analyses and other regulatory analyses, and information from trade publications. This information is located in the RCRA Docket under the Phases I, II, III, and IV Land Disposal Restrictions Rulemakings, as well as listings for organobromines, petroleum, and carbamates.

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
