Proposed Significant Modification to the Clean Air Act Permit Program
Permit for
Ineos Silicas Americas, LLC in Joliet

Ineos Silicas Americas, LLC has applied for a modification of the Clean Air Act Permit Program (CAAPP) permit for its industrial inorganic chemicals manufacturing facility located at 101 Ingalls Avenue in Joliet. The permit revisions qualify as a significant modification to the CAAPP permit. The permit is being modified to increase process limits and particulate matter emissions and to incorporate language from construction permit 04010025.

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (Illinois EPA) has made a preliminary determination to issue a revised permit. Because the revisions would qualify as a significant modification of the current CAAPP permit, the Illinois EPA has prepared a draft of a revised permit and is accepting public comments before taking final action on the application.

Comments on the proposed revisions to the permit must be postmarked by midnight March 29, 2007. If sufficient interest is expressed in the revision, a hearing may be held. The CAAPP is Illinois' operating permit program for major sources of emissions, as required by Title V of the Clean Air Act (Act). The conditions of CAAPP permits are enforceable by the public, as well as by the USEPA and Illinois EPA. In addition to implementing Title V of the Act, CAAPP permits may contain "Title I Conditions," i.e., conditions established under the permit programs for new and modified emission units, pursuant to Title I of the Act. There are Title I provisions (denoted as T1) in this permit. There are new Title I provisions in Condition 7.6.6(d) establishing limitations on the fuel oil #2 storage tank and there are revised Title I provisions in Condition 7.1.6 to increase process limits and particulate matter emissions.
