of the Proposed Revision of the Federally Enforceable State Operating  
Permit for  
Little Company of Mary Hospital in Evergreen Park

Little Company of Mary Hospital has requested that the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency revise the federally enforceable state operating permit (FESOP) regulating the air emissions from its hospital operations located at 2800 West 95<sup>th</sup> Street in Evergreen Park. The operating permit is being revised to eliminate one of the boilers at the facility bringing the total number of boilers to six and add an emergency generator bringing the total number of emergency generators to seven.

The Illinois EPA is accepting comments on the draft permit. Comments must be postmarked by midnight December 24, 2005. If sufficient interest is expressed in the permit, a hearing may be held. The 1990 amendments to the Clean Air Act require potentially major sources of air emissions to obtain federally enforceable operating permits. A FESOP permit allows a source that is potentially major to take operational limits in the permit so that it is a non-major source. The permit will contain federally enforceable limitations that restrict the facility's emissions to non-major levels. The permit will be enforceable by the USEPA, as well as the Illinois EPA.
