Proposed Significant Modification to the Clean Air Act Permit Program
Permit for
Knaack Manufacturing Company in Crystal Lake

Knaack Manufacturing Company has applied for a modification of the Clean Air Act Permit Program (CAAPP) permit for its metal tool box manufacturing and painting operations located at 420 East Terra Cotta Avenue in Crystal Lake. The permit revisions qualify as a significant modification to the CAAPP permit. The permit is primarily being modified to establish limits for hazardous air pollutants below major source thresholds and to incorporate language from construction permit 02010018 into the CAAPP permit.

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (Illinois EPA) has made a preliminary determination to issue a revised permit. Because the revisions would qualify as a significant modification of the current CAAPP permit, the Illinois EPA has prepared a draft of a revised permit and is accepting public comments before taking final action on the application.

Comments on the proposed revisions to the permit must be postmarked by midnight September 2, 2006. If sufficient interest is expressed in the revision, a hearing may be held. The CAAPP is Illinois' operating permit program for major sources of emissions, as required by Title V of the Clean Air Act (Act). The conditions of CAAPP permits are enforceable by the public, as well as by the USEPA and Illinois EPA. In addition to implementing Title V of the Act, CAAPP permits may contain "Title I Conditions," i.e., conditions established under the permit programs for new and modified emission units, pursuant to Title I of the Act. There are Title I provisions (denoted as T1) in this permit, of which none of these provisions are being revised by this permit transaction. Also, there are no new Title I provisions being added to this permit as a result of this permit transaction.
