of the Proposed Revision of the Federally Enforceable State Operating
Permit for
Aalsey Refractories Company in Aalsey

Aalsey Refractories Company has requested that the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency revise the federally enforceable state operating permit (FESOP) for the air emissions from its refractory plant located on Highway 106 in Aalsey. The permit is being revised to include operations of two storage silos and the replacement of one clay grinder. The Illinois EPA has made a preliminary determination that the application would comply with the environmental regulations and has prepared a draft permit for public review.

The Illinois EPA is accepting comments on the draft permit. Comments must be postmarked by midnight August 3, 2007. If sufficient interest is expressed in the permit, a hearing may be held. Copies of the documents will be made available upon request.

The 1990 amendments to the Clean Air Act require potentially major sources of air emissions to obtain federally enforceable operating permits. A FESOP allows a source that is potentially major to take operational limits in the permit so that it is a non-major source. The permit will contain federally enforceable limitations that restrict the facility's emissions to non-major levels. The permit will be enforceable by the USEPA, as well as the Illinois EPA.
