## **Notes from Interview with Winkelman Resident Regarding Exposure Assumptions**

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**Record of Interview with Mary Corona**  
**April 22, 2008**

John Hillenbrand interviewed Mary Corona and Adolfo Espinoza at their residence to compare exposure assumptions to community experience.

- Mary is 47 years old and Adolfo is 49 and they live near Third Street and Ray Avenue.
- Mary explained that in Hayden and Winkelman there are no theaters or other forms of entertainment like bigger towns so kids spend a lot of time out doors playing. 4:30-7:30 after school is not uncommon. In summer the time could easily be 8 hours total playing in the washes and around town. She felt that 2 hours per day, 150 days a year was reasonable for a soil exposure in remote areas such as the old Kennecott smelter.
- At the recreation pool facility kids are there all summer and 2 to 3 hours during the school year.
- She said she has not seen too many kids in the in-town tailings piles but that they have been known to be there. (Tracks and holes in fences suggest frequent visits)
- She remembers playing as a child in Kennecott wash in process waters that flowed for the old smelter because it was the only water available in that area during the summer.
